

The Rotary Foundation's endowment fund, the Permanent Fund, already helps support Rotary Foundation programs that advance our mission of 'doing good in the world'. The Permanent Fund enables individuals to combine their gifts into a significant force to address the world's greatest needs for generations to come. In a Rotary year, about \$8 million from the Permanent Fund is made available to support Foundation programs (different from support by the Annual Fund and Polio Fund) including:

#### **District Designated Funds**

Has your club received a district simplified grant? Many of our clubs have done so much to support efforts in our own communities through DDF money.

#### **Matching Grants**

Is your club a recipient of a matching grant? Many of our clubs have done so much to support efforts in our global communities through DDF money

#### **Ambassadorial Scholarships**

# Doesn't it make sense for you to support the Permanent Fund?

You do not have to contribute any money at any time while alive to the Permanent Fund to become a benefactor or bequest society member. (There is always the option to contribute now net assets and become a Major Gifts Donor). THIS IS SO EASY TO DO. To become a benefactor or bequest society member as part of your estate plans is a revocable decision. So why are so few Rotarians a bequest society member? I already know you are passionate about Rotary! Why not make Rotary a part of your legacy? Ask recent Beguest Society Member Bruce Beadle of the West Chester Club why he became a Bequest Society Member in November 2011. Ask present, past, and future District Governors why they have given to the Permanent Fund and they'll tell you they are passionate about Rotary. I'll tell that they are also leaders and visionaries.

Are you a leader in your club? Why not set an example in your club and help improve our district's statistics. We have around 1,800 members in our district and only about 7% are Benefactors or Bequest Society Members. This number increases only slightly to about 8% in the world. Let's set an example for the Rotarians of the world.



#### Here are the ways to give to the Permanent Fund:

- A Benefactor is an individual or couple that gives \$1,000 to the Permanent Fund during their lifetimes or makes provisions in their estate plans to give any amount to Permanent Fund.
- **Bequests** Remember The Rotary Foundation in your estate plans
- A Bequest Society member is an individual or couple that has made a provision in their estate plan to give at least \$10,000 to TRF. A gift of \$25,000 in your estate plan to "The Rotary Foundation Permanent Fund" would provide approximately \$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation each year and make you a Paul Harris Fellow, in perpetuity!
- Major Outright Gifts of \$10,000 or more
- Appreciated securities, cash, real estate, bonds and other non-cash gifts
- Major Gift Pledges- Achieve your goal sooner
- Life Income Agreements- Make a major gift and receive lifetime payments

If you choose the designation of "SHARE", a portion of the earnings from your gift will go to your home district's District Designated Fund (DDF) in perpetuity. Call TRF at 866-976-8279 and let them know you'd like to become a member of this distinguished group of Rotarians.

#### District Matching Grants—International Service Projects Report- Submitted by Vasanth Prahbu

This Rotary year was a very successful one being able to spend all the grants money allocated to our district for 2011-12. More clubs have participated in the matching grant program for international service and district simplified grant program for local community service projects.

#### **Matching Grants:**

A total of twelve matching grant projects for international service were initiated by eight clubs in our district. All the projects were related to giving a better life to the hundreds of economically challenged peoples of India, Egypt, Antigua, WI, Brazil, Mexico, South Africa, and Madagascar. Besides, we funded one project each in Ecuador and Kenya. The areas of focus were education, health and clean drinking water. The total cost of the twelve projects initiate/supported by our clubs and district this Rotary year was \$294,278 – a record for our district! The funding for all these projects came from cash contributions by the clubs, District Designated Fund contributions and the corresponding Rotary Foundation matching grants from World Fund. The cash and DDF contributions from our clubs and district amounted to \$32,646 and \$31,338, respectively. Please see the table below for more details.

On April 14, 2012, District 7450 will be sending a GSE to District 4530 in Brasilla, Brazil for 6 weeks. The team consists of Rotarian Team Leader Sandra Goldberg from the Philadelphia Rotary Club; team members Tonia Adleta sponsored by the West Grove-Avondale Rotary Club, Evan Black sponsored by the Philadelphia Rotary Club, Anna Dennery sponsored by the Glenside Rotary Club, Lavell Kirby sponsored by the Northeast Sunrisers Rotary Club and Maxwell Wolfson-Lovitz sponsored by the Upper Darby-Lansdowne Rotary Club. The team attended the Northeast Link - Zone Orientation in Boxborough, MA is January and then met weekly for Portuguese lessons. It is a great team and we look forward to hearing about their travels through their daily blog.

Our next GSE team will be with District 3600 in South Korea. The incoming team will be here from mid October 2012 until mid November 2012. We are currently looking for Rotary clubs to host the team for one week at a time. We are also looking for a Rotarian team leader and 4 non-Rotarian team members to be a part of the outbound GSE team that will travel to District 3600 in April 2013.

# District 7450 seeks Rotary Team Leader for Goodwill Exchange to South Korea

Rotary International District 7450 is seeking a Rotarian team leader to lead four outstanding professionals to visit Rotary District 3600 in South Korea for four weeks, in April 2013, as part of the Group Study Exchange program of The Rotary Foundation.

Through the program, teams of professionals exchange visits between paired areas in different countries. The awards involve six-week visits, during which team members share homes with Rotary families and have the opportunity to meet their professional counterparts. They will also give presentations to Rotary clubs and other groups about their home country.

The Rotary Foundation provides a round-trip air ticket, and local Rotarians in the host country provide meals, lodging and group travel in their district. The Team leader and members pay for their personal and incidental expenses, as well as travel insurance.

Rotarians interested in applying for Team Leader; should be active Rotarians in their local club and in the district, be able to commit to being away for all 6 weeks, be committed to building a strong team including language lessons for the exchange and be willing to assist the incoming GSE team during their stay and promote GSE throughout the district.

#### **Scholarships in Rotary District 7450**

The Peace Fellowship Application window in Rotary District 7450 for study in 2013-2014 is open until April 30, 2012. There are two kinds of Peace Fellowships: a two year master's degree program and a three month certificate program. These are fully subsidized by Rotary International. Candidates must download applications from Rotary International and then apply through a local Rotary club. The Rotary District 7450 Scholarship Committee will interview applicants recommended by local clubs on May 23 at La Salle University and subsequently make recommendations to Rotary International.

Ambassador Scholarships coming to an end!
Rotary International is phasing out its Ambassador Scholarship program which has funded 47,000 scholars since 1947.

Our final District 7450 Ambassador Scholar, Lindsey Elkin, will study in Cape Town, South Africa, next year. She will graduate from Vanderbilt University in May, 2012.

David Gau, our 2011-2012 Ambassador Scholar, is currently studying in Australia. He will be back in our area during July before he heads off to the University of Pittsburgh for Ph. D studies.

Kyra Turner-Zogbekor, our 2010-2011 Ambassador Scholar, has returned from Ghana and will speak at the District Assembly on April 23. Her summary of her own scholarship experience is now available on the District 7450 website.

Rotary's new Global Grant Scholarships will launch in 2013. Study must be in one of Rotary's Future Vision areas for humanitarian purposes. The District 7450 Scholarship Committee has selected its nominee to Rotary International for one of these scholarships. A decision from Rotary International is not likely until late fall of 2012.

District 7450 is "tentatively" slated to host the final group of seven incoming Ambassador Scholars who will study in the Greater Philadelphia area during the 2012-2013 academic year. We will need a host Rotarian for each one (NB---No housing is required for these students...just some personal ongoing communication and perhaps periodic invitations to area, club and family events and tourist attractions).
