Message from DG Dawn deFuria

Following the Rotary calendar, the international theme for October is "Economic and Community Development" Month.



Economic and community development is one of Rotary's six areas of focus. Your club can help by determining your community's needs and resources and is an important starting point for any community project. Community assessments identify the community's strengths and weaknesses and how Rotarians will be able to work with the community to meet its needs. It is vital to conduct a community assessment, often in conjunction with a cooperating organization, before starting your project. Remember to consider the historical, cultural, and social dynamics of the community with which you wish to partner.

October 24th is World Polio Day. It is a day to celebrate how far we have come and an opportunity for all of us to raise awareness and funds to complete the work of eradication. President Ian Riseley is asking every Rotary club to participate some way in World Polio Day activities, and I am asking you to visit endpolio.org for ideas and to register your event. Whether you host a silent auction, a fundraising walk, or a Purple Pinkie Day, your Rotary club can make a real difference.

This year, the World Polio Day livestream event will take place at the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation headquarters in Seattle. You can watch it on endpolio.org beginning at 2:30 p.m. Pacific time. Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year for the next three years. This amount will be matched 2-to-1 by the Gates Foundation – effectively tripling the value of all money Rotary raised on World Polio Day and throughout the year. Let's all make a difference on World Polio Day – and help End Polio Now. This year alone our district has already raised over \$9400 for Polio and we still have the Kick Out Polio event in May 2018.

District committee getting ready for 'Plant a Tree' program

Greetings and Assistance from District 7450 Plant a Tree Committee,

As requested by Rotary International President Ian H.S. Riseley, and in the spirit of the commitment to planting trees by Paul Harris, founder of Rotary, we are working on a program to help our Rotary Clubs participate in the Rotary Tree Planting Initiative which seeks to plant 1.2 million trees worldwide during this Rotary year.

We know at least 12 Clubs are already planning projects to meet their Clubs' goal of one tree for each member. To support those Clubs and others who will be looking for ways to meet the goal, our committee has been developing a list of groups with whom we can partner that already have varied programs.

The Philadelphia Horticulture Society (PHS) offers several programs in which Rotary Clubs can participate in hands-on projects or by making a donation.

District 7450 Clubs can donate money to a special "Rotary Trees Fund Campaign" from October, 2017 to February, 2018 via the "Rotary" link on the PHS website (phsonline.org). Funds will purchase trees for stream bank buffer planting projects and 12 ft. to 16 ft. root ball trees to be planted by PHS Tree Tender groups in parks, curbside strips and open spaces throughout southeastern Pennsylvania. \$150 will buy a root ball tree and \$50 will buy a stream bank tree. Clubs can make donations of \$25, \$50, \$75, \$100, \$125, \$150, and "Other").

Rotary, Interact and Rotaract Clubs can donate funds and solicit individuals and businesses to donate funds directly via the "Rotary Trees Funds Campaign" link (phsonline.org).

PHS will also set up a text message donation platform for Rotarians to use beginning October 1, 2017. All donations to this restricted "Rotary" fund at the PHS are tax deductible.

Clubs would not have to plant stream bank tree

or root trees purchased with their donations as others (Tree Tenders or Rotarians) will plant them. Clubs that want to help plant the trees that they have purchased through their donations would contact the local PHS Tree Tender group via the Tree Tender link on the PHS website (phsonline.org) about helping with their fall, 2017 and spring, 2018 planting dates.



Clubs that plan to use other methods can purchase wholesale container trees from Eaton Farms in Leesport, pick them up and plant them in selected areas in the community;

The Philadelphia Orchard Project (<https://www.phillyorchards.org>) plants fruit trees in the city

for a \$60 fee per tree. The trees produce 150 pounds of fruit per year; and The National Forest Foundation (NFF) will plant a seedling in a forest in the United States for each \$1 donation. (www.nationalforests.org/get-involved/tree-planting-programs).

Plans are underway for Rotarians to participate in a riparian stream-bank planting on Sunday April 22 as part of the District Conference Day of Service and Earth Day. If you are not able to participate in this project, you can contact your local Tree Tender group to volunteer with them. Complete details about these opportunities and perhaps others will be available later this month. Let's work together to help green our communities through this exciting program!

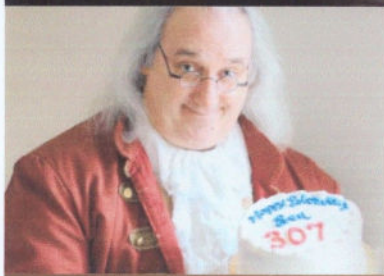

They collected non-perishable food, bottled water, cleaning products, clothes, shoes, diapers and wipes, baby formula, car seats, strollers, toys, blankets, sheets, and all types of pet food (including cat, dog, bird, hamster, and guinea pig) and supplies for them. There were also monetary donations given to the club by which the members went out and bought cat and dog supplies along with canned food items.

The outpouring of the community was heart-warming as one car after another drove through dropping off bags and boxes of so desperately needed supplies. Their generosity was greatly appreciated as most items especially for pets and infants were brand new. Also, all packing boxes and materials were so kindly donated by Dan Fellona.

The Swarthmore Charity Fun Fair



The Rotary Club of Swarthmore invites any and all Rotary Clubs to participate in its annual Charity Fun Fair, scheduled this year for Sunday, May 20, 2018. Any group may raise funds for a cause of its choice in exchange for providing fun for those attending the event. All are invited to come have fun while helping others.

The Fun Fair is in its 17th year, conceived as an opportunity to combine community-building with serving others. Several streets in downtown Swarthmore are blocked off, a parade with a small-town flavor begins the event, and continuous live music is performed on flat-bed trucks situated at three of the Fair's corners. Members of the Swarthmore Rotary Club organize and advertise the event, host a Food Court, and provide highly popular "inflatable" fun for children of multiple ages with Moon Bounces, Obstacle Courses, and Slides.

The rest of the fun is provided by other groups raising money for the charity or cause of their choice. "Booth space" is reserved with a minimal \$25 to help cover Fair costs (the fee is waived for student groups). The type of fun provided is limited only by imagination and in the past has included activities such as face painting, hair braiding, ball tossing, pretzel selling, jewelry making, fortune telling, smoothie blending, massage receiving, raffle buying, and test driving new Lincoln cars.

Non-profits and other organizations that have benefitted from the fund-raising have in the past included, for examples, to name a few: The American Cancer Society, Relay for Life, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, the Delaware County Literacy Council, the Chester Children's Chorus, WorkReady Chester, Haiti Clinic, End Polio Now, the Rotaract Leadership Conference in Washington, D.C.

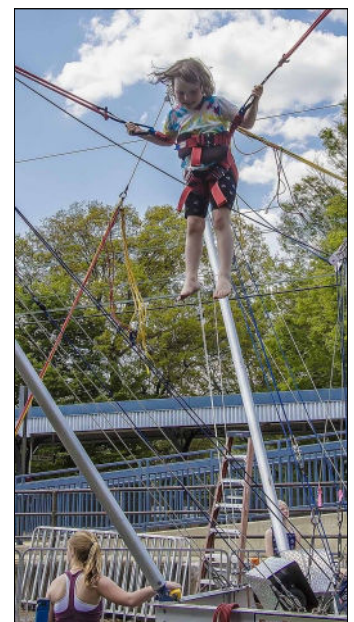
Thousands of people have come to the Swarthmore Charity Fun Fair, and thousands of dollars have been raised to help make a difference.

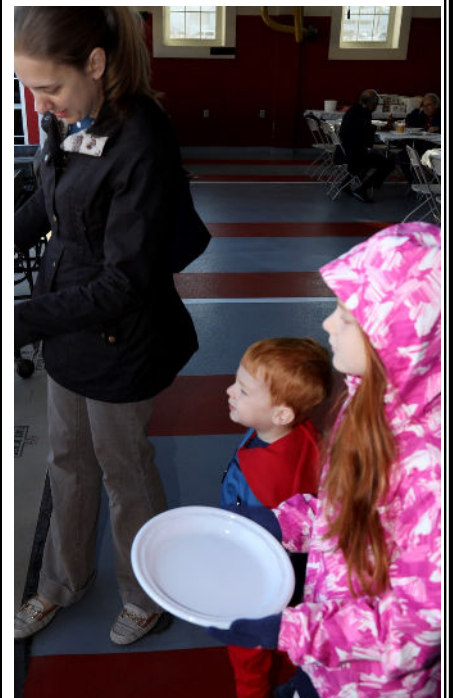


566 enjoy Ardmore Rotary Pancake Breakfast, help Marion Fire Company 2017 marks 30-year anniversary for fundraiser
