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49 District Rotary Clubs participate in Tree-Planting challenge

A total of 47 of 54 District 7450 Rotary Clubs answered the challenge of RI President Ian Riseley to plant trees during this Rotary year. The Rotary Clubs report planting more than 2093 trees including the District Tree-Plant Event at the conclusion of the District Conference, Earth Day, April 22.

About 100 turn out to plant 80 trees in Bob White Park on Earth Day

An estimated 100 Rotarians, family and friends turned out April 22 to plant 80 trees in Bob White Park in Upper Merion Township in the final event of District Conference weekend. The tree-planting project was coordinated by the District Tree Committee in partnership with the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society (PHS). The event was in response to a challenge to Rotarians by Rotary International President Ian Riseley to plant one tree for each member during this Rotary year.

Rotarians raised \$12,025 to fund the trees which were selected by PHS staff and delivered to the park.

Among the donations was \$2,000 from the Rotary Club of Tokyo. Two cherry trees ,which were among the 15 species of trees from the PHS, were planted by Ardmore Rotarians .in recognition of the Tokyo Club. Ardmore Rotary Club has a 45-year partnership with the Tokyo Rotary Club dating to 1973 when the Ardmore Club sent 300 dogwood trees to the Tokyo Club for planting in the Imperial Gardens. That gift

was in response to reports the dogwood trees in the Imperial Gardens were dying. Those trees were sent by President Howard Taft in 1915 as a gift of friendship in response to Tokyo's 1912 gift of 3000 cherry trees which were planted along the Tidal Basin in Washington, D.C. Representatives from the PHS conducted a pre-planting session to explain how to handle and plant the 50-pound balled tree's.

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Philadelphia Rotary Club hosts LaSalle Academy student presenters

Three seventh-graders from LaSalle Academy's Early Act Club in the Lower Kensington section of Philadelphia stole the show at the May 3 luncheon meeting of the Philadelphia Rotary Club. The students told the Rotary members about their school, which runs from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day for 11 months each year. The school literally rose from the dead in 2003 after a large Catholic parish closed due to economic conditions and a small group of nuns and Christian Brothers established the LaSalle Academy in the old convent of the parish. The average family income of students at La Salle Academy is \$ 18,200. In addition, 62 percent of the students are from single-parent homes, eight percent live with a grandparent or with another family member and 23 percent of the students have one parent incarcerated. Despite these statistics, each of the LaSalle



Academy families shows their support with a nominal \$200 yearly tuition. The Rotary Club of Philadelphia has become one of many partners in support of this school which basically runs on donations as an independent Catholic school which respects children of all faiths. Philadelphia Rotary Club PP Joe Batory welcomed the students who were accompanied by LaSalle Academy President Sister Jean McGowan.
