Rotaplast Mission to Africa

Rotarians from District 7450 returned from a fifteen-day Rotaplast mission to Monrovia. Liberia this month. The team of nine Rotarians and a medical staff of twelve provided corrective plastic surgery for children with cleft lip and cleft palate. The surgeons also treated people with burn scars and disfigurements including keloid scars and wounds incurred during Liberia's civil war. In addition to children thev saw many adults who



had long standing deformities that could not be corrected in Liberia.

As in most developing nations the medical facilities are not always up to American standards. Rotaplast travels with twenty-six large cases of equipment for everything needed except operating tables and lights. Operations were performed in St. Joseph's Hospital, one of only five in Liberia. Because of limited space, Rotaplast surgeons set up two operating tables in one room. The mission was aided by the Rotary Clubs of Monrovia and Simkor who made all ground arrangements, recruited patients and generated publicity with the public. Equally important were the Rotaractors from the University of Liberia who were always with the team providing assistance in many ways. Although Liberia's official language is English, the Liberians speak a dialect that is not understandable to Americans, and they don't understand ours.

The Rotaractors were excellent translators during registration, examinations, and daily communications with patients in the wards and operating theatre. Jim Bradley of the Broomall Rotary Club noted, "These young adults are helpful and resourceful in a hundred ways. We couldn't hope for a more obliging and competent group of people to work with."

Our Rotarians were very impressed with the kind and ever pleasant manner of the Liberians.

The team's photo-journalist, Mark Cunningham of Paoli-Malvern-Berwyn RC commented, "Everyone we meet is friendly, patient and understanding. There is never a lack of smiles as they wait to see a doctor or just passing in the hallway. Even when we must decline to provide surgery, they remain appreciative and cheerful."

- 3. Submit a completed application by May 15, 2019. Grants will be awarded in September 2019 for that Rotary year.

Local Rotarian Visits Gambia Goat Dairy

Dr. Carla Chieffo, President of Paoli-Malvern-Berwyn (PMB) Rotary Club and Penn Vet alumnus, visited The Gambia Goat Dairy (GGD) project in The Gambia, Africa this summer.

GGD is an ambitious project aiming to create a commercial-scale, sustainable herd of milking goats. The dairy will model best practices while supplying local residents with affordable and safe dairy products that will help provide adequate nutrition.

Now three years into the project, construction was completed on a solar-powered borehole, which will provide the future dairy with 30,000 liters of water each day. With water now available, GGD can begin construction of a perimeter wall. GGD has also hired a local Gambian that lives on the property as a watchman.

After getting the facility up and running with at least 50 milking goats, the next two phases will involve educational outreach and shifting from producer to processor, creating a dairy market from the ground up for domestic farmers. The end goals are for the dairy to be financially selfsustaining and to reduce malnourishment in the local communities.

Dr. Chieffo also met with the Fajara Rotary Club

in The Gambia, which is interested in supporting the project and working with PMB Rotary to obtain a global grant.

This project was supported through Penn Vet, Penn's Global Internship Program, and Rotary District Grants and The Gundaker Foundation.

Sushil Kumar Gupta Selected to be 2020-2021 Rotary President

Sushil Kumar Gupta, of the Rotary Club of Delhi Midwest, Delhi, India, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for Presi-

dent of Rotary International for 2020-21.

Gupta wants to increase Rotary's humanitarian impact as well as the diversity of its membership. "As individuals, we can only do so much," Gupta said in a statement. "But when 1.2 million Rotarians work together, there is no limit to what we can achieve, and in the process, we can truly change the world."

Gupta has been a Rotarian since 1977 and has served Rotary as district governor, training leader, and resource group adviser; and as a member, vice chair, and chair of several committees. He has also received the coveted Padma Shri Award, the fourth-highest civilian award in India, conferred by the president of India for distinguished service to tourism and social work.



In May, Cheshire England celebrated the charter of its first corporate Rotary Club, the Rotary Club of Bentley Cheshire. Since many companies already have a Corporate Social Responsibility Program to support their communities, an in-house Rotary Club was the perfect way to engage employees in offering community service.

The meetings are very efficient and focused, alternating between a meeting room at Bentley and local pubs and restaurants. "We do not charge for meals or drinks as we don't always have meals and drinks," explains club Secretary Sarah Newcombe. "We have our meeting first, then the ones who wish to stay for food do and the others can either stay and just have a drink or can go home."

The employees have also recruited friends from outside Bentley to join the club and the idea is spreading to other companies.
