## Changing the Trend: Retaining New Members

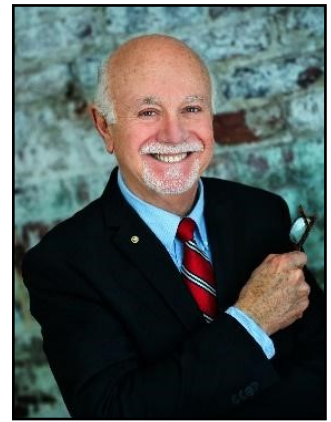
It is a little known fact that our district does a fairly good job of attracting new members. About 175 to 200 join us each year. However, about 200 to 225 leave us. That's not a good trend.

Certainly, people move away, change jobs and so on. However, the majority leave in their first year of Rotary membership. The reason most often given for early-onset-resignation is that the club wasn't what the person thought it would be. Experience strongly suggests that a lack of communications with fellow members underlies people's dissatisfaction. New members are often lost in the shuffle and don't feel they fit in. However, many clubs address the problem before it begins.

Clubs in Mexico City require a new member be assigned to a service committee on the day he/she is installed as a member. The committee immediately embraces the individual with discussion, planning, and assignments. That gives the individual both fellowship and a sense of purpose. He/she becomes an integral part of a team and all that it represents.

In Alaska, a new member is assigned to a close mentorship by the club president. The person always sits next to the president, attends to all meetings, conversations and planning. He/she is virtually embedded into the presidency and soon learns everything about the club's activities, goals, history, problems, and a general who's who in the club. It provides perspective and engenders a sense of belonging in the group.

The second most commonly given reason for leaving is a conflict with others in the club. That's a bigger problem to solve and not achievable in this Newsletter. However, there will be a workshop on Conflict Resolution at the District Conference, March 15, 16, 2019. ## District Rotarians Heading To Houston For Hurricane Harvey Rebuild

As we continue to learn of human needs in the aftermath of Hurricane Florence, a Rotarian led team will be addressing the human needs from last year's Hurricane Harvey.

Busy hurricane seasons and other weather disasters keep Longwood Rotarian Bob Curran and his wife, Janet, busy organizing and coordinating volunteer rebuild work teams. These teams usually are between 18-33 volunteers and head into the storm damaged areas about 9-12 months after the storm to rebuild damaged homes. This allows the "on the ground" agencies time to secure funding and housing for the hundreds of volunteers throughout the country that will arrive into the storm damaged area.

The week of October 28-November 3<sup>rd</sup> will mark the 15<sup>th</sup> rebuilding trip the Curran's have orga-

nized. The team will be heading to the Southeast region of Houston, TX - one of the hardest hit places from Hurricane Harvey.

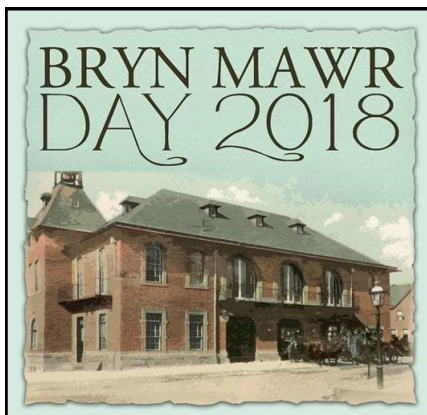


Islands. Doug helped shape environmental law to protect the environment and earned a reputation as a problem solver.

Doug has dedicated his life's work to the cause of environmental protection, sustainability, and education. As a graduate of Yale law school in 1970, he was an early environmental activist and joined the Pennsylvania Environmental Strike Force under the Attorney General (now restructured as the Department of Environmental Protection). In the federal EPA, he was Regional Council overseeing New York, New Jersey and the Virgin

Today he practices environmental law in private practice and teaches at Temple University Fox School of Business Legal Studies. He is a member of the Pennsylvania Bar and federal courts, including the Supreme Court. His current assignment includes the legal counsel of the New York City Ways and Means Committee. It controls the fourth largest budget in the United States.

This year's event will be livestreamed from The College of Physicians of Philadelphia, known as the "birthplace of American medicine." It is one of the oldest professional medical organizations in the United States.

Global health experts and celebrities will discuss our remarkable progress toward a polio-free world. Patience Asimwe, the protagonist of Rotary's upcoming virtual reality film, "Two Drops of Patience," will introduce the movie. A sneak peek from Rotary's documentary "Drop to Zero" will also be featured. Jeffrey Kluger, senior editor for Time

magazine, will discuss his experience traveling to Nigeria with Rotary to report on polio eradication. The event will also celebrate the 30th anniversary of the founding of the GPEI.
