The 23-member Philadelphia Rotary Team of bicyclists raised close to \$80,000 for Multiple Sclerosis research by participating in the Cherry Hill to Ocean City ride September 27 and 28. The team's eight-year participation has raised over \$460,000 for multiple sclerosis research. Leading the team for all nine years has been Philadelphia Rotarian Jack Beiter (front row, center) who is recovering from a broken collarbone, two broken ribs and a punctured lung sustained when a rider ran into him during the ride. Beiter, who is flanked by his twin sons, Jeffrey and Justin, raised \$34,000 toward the pledge. A total of 21 riders will be honored as VIPs as result of raising over \$1,000 for MS. The Rotaplast team returned in late September from Cebu City, Philippines. The team's


mission was a tremendous success in making dreams real for so many children, giving them a





Ardmore Rotary plants 'Trees of Friendship'

Ardmore Rotary Club has planted 24 pink cherry trees in four locations during October as a token of friendship from the people of Japan through the Tokyo Rotary Club.

The trees are planted in Garden for Blind in Wynnewood, Haverford College, Normandy Park in Ardmore and Loomis Elementary School in Broomall.

Four years ago, the Ardmore Rotary Club pre-

sented 200 dogwood trees to the people of Japan as a continuation of a gesture of friendship between the U.S. and Japan that began in 1912. A report in late 1960s that most of the dogwood trees had died or were destroyed during World War II prompted Ardmore Rotary to donate 300 replacement trees The project was chaired by then RI vice-president and Ardmore

Rotarian George Uhlig who had visited the Tokyo Rotary Club when the report was discussed.

The replacement trees were planted in the Imperial Palace Gardens in Tokyo. Later the Tokyo Rotary Club Tokyo sent Ardmore Rotary Club 12 cherry trees which were

Palace Gardens of Tokyo, and in public areas throughout Tokyo. The formal dedication took place following the 2004 RI Convention in Japan.

Earlier this year, Ardmore Rotary Club received a gift of \$10,000.00 from the Rotary Club of Tokyo to plant new cherry trees in America and to assist in restoration of the Garden for the Blind.
