This is not one person's idea of how to execute this Rotary imaging plan, but a collaboration of a team that spans our district and encompasses the skill sets that we need, whether it is strategic use of resources, enhanced use of social media or impactful marketing. 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SWARTHMORE COLLABORATES WITH CHESTER FOR INSPIRING PROJECT

The City of Chester is plagued by high rates of poverty, unemployment, and a lack of opportunity for its residents. At the same time, there is a severe shortage in the skilled trades workforce, both in our region and across the nation. Rotarians are stepping up and partnering with local organizations to address both problems with an ambitious new initiative. Spearheaded by the Rotary Club of Swarthmore, the Chester Trades Education Project, or CTEP, will play a crucial role in improving access to education in the skilled trades, thereby offering Chester's residents a pathway to economic independence.



In addition to the Rotary Club of Swarthmore, four key partners make up the CTEP team:

- Through fundraising and grants, the Rotary Club of Chester made the first major commitment to support CTEP and successfully seeded the project with a significant donation of \$12,000. Individual Rotarians in the Swarthmore and Chester Clubs are lending their leadership skills and vision to establish the program and ensure its sustainability.
- Delaware County Community College (DCCC) provides skilled trades education and training through its certificate and degree programs. The skilled trades programs, like all programs at DCCC, are competency-based with embedded assessment and industry credentials that align with the skills needed by regional employers.
- Riverside Futures Regional Community Development Corporation is tasked with screening and selecting the Chester residents who will join the program. A Chester-based nonprofit, Riverside Futures will mentor students throughout their participation in CTEP.
- Chester Housing Authority (CHA) will provide meeting and classroom space at its various community
 centers so that training can be conducted right in the City of Chester. In fact, a carpentry class is
 already underway at one of the CHA locations. Additionally, these designated areas will serve as
 gathering spaces where students can study together, work with their mentors, and catch shuttle buses
 to the DCCC campus for in-person training when needed.

CTEP is off and running with an ambitious schedule. Interested Chester residents and their families attended a kick-off meeting at CHA in July, and since then, additional prospective students have joined the pipeline. Fourteen students have already enrolled for fall 2021, and the cohort can accommodate up to 16 students. The Rotary Club of Swarthmore is actively soliciting donations and hosted a Block Party fundraiser in Swarthmore on September 25th to support the CTEP students. They have set a goal of \$30,000 to support this unique project.

PROFILE: Joseph Batory

Joseph Batory of the Philadelphia Rotary Club grew up in the southwest area of the city and never moved far away. After graduating from LaSalle College, he began his career in education in Camden, New Jersey teaching middle school.

Joe returned to LaSalle as Director of Sports Information, promoting and traveling with the school's basketball team. "For six years I had a dream job promoting LaSalle's basketball teams and some great players." At that time, he earned his master's degree at Glassboro, now known as Rowan College, and his PhD in education at the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1980 he joined Upper Darby School District in administration and was elevated to Superintendent several years later. The district had twelve schools with over twelve-thousand students. Seventy foreign languages were spoken by students, many as their first language. Joe met the challenge by instituting several *English as the Second Language* classes informally known as Survival English.

When budget cuts impacted the music program, Joe took an unusual step to correct the problem. "I saw it just like the old Judy Garland and Andy Rooney movies. When they needed money, they said, "Let's put on a show". So we did too." He created the *Upper Darby Arts and Education Foundation* and put on musical galas. The first one garnered forty-thousand dollars. The shows continue to this day and have brought in over 2.5 million dollars.

In 2018 he was honored as the Father and Founder of the *Upper Darby Arts and Education Foundation* in recognition of his pioneering work. In 2019 he received the Inspire Award from Philadelphia's prestigious Musicopia organization in recognition of Joe's impacts on advocating and providing for music education. In 2000, the American Association of School Administrators presented him with the Lifetime Distinguished Service Award.

Joe retired in 1999 but continued to serve the community. He personally provided scholarships to thirty-eight Upper Darby High School graduates. "I have never forgotten growing up in poverty," says Joe. "Giving back is part of my legacy."

Following retirement, he and another educator formed a consulting company that worked with school districts across Pennsylvania, inspecting school districts on behalf of the federal government regarding compliance with Title One Grants.

Joe has been a Rotarian for over thirty years; sixteen in Upper Darby and fifteen in Philadelphia. Joe became the President of the Rotary Club of Philadelphia during its Centennial year, 2010-2011. Joe's wife, Joan, was the Governor of Rotary District 7450 that same year.

Joe chaired his club's *The Rotary Foundation of Philadelphia* which awarded about thirty thousand dollars annually. He also initiated and managed a project that distributes more than thirty thousand dictionaries, atlases, and thesauri to twenty-five Philadelphia city schools.

In 2013, the Rotary International Foundation presented him with its *Award for Meritorious Service* for his work with scholarships and humanitarian endeavors. He is a Paul Harris Fellow and member of the Bequest Society.

Joe and Joan have been married for fifty-three years. "It was an arranged marriage," Says Joe. "Our grandmothers were friends and agreed we should meet and they set us up. Frankly, they were right. It was love at first sight."

YOUTH EXCHANGE REMAINS ACTIVE

"The Covid-19 pandemic certainly set things back for Youth Exchange and initially caused us to react quickly." Reported Chair Donna Henry. "We had a child in France and another in Chile who needed to get home quickly. In addition, there were four students visiting with us for whom getting back into their own countries was not always easy. As hectic as we were last spring we have been just as quiet for much of last year. Frankly, we needed a break."

Our Student Exchange Committee continues working with ESSEX, (Eastern States Student Exchange), to plan for the future. They are now making arrangements for short term visits in June and full school year visits in August 2022.



2021-2022 Timeline:

- Long Term (School Year) Application deadline is ideally November 1 for the first 10 students. If we don't get to 10 students, we'll accept applications until January 15.
- Summer Exchanges application deadline is March 15.

As Youth Exchange continues to work with schools in the district, they are also in need of families to host students from overseas. Rotarians who are interested in doing so may learn more on the District Website.

Lewis B. Beatty Jr.



IT TOOK A ROTARIAN

TAKE A BOOK • SHARE A BOOK

Just about everyone knows about Little Free Libraries. They seem to be everywhere. At last count there were over 100,000 located in 108 countries transacting about 42,000,000 books each year. Yes, forty-two million. Libraries can be found in rural areas, the suburbs and in apartment house lobbies. The libraries create a very positive sense of community wherever they are.

The creator was Todd H. Bol, a Rotarian from Hudson, Wisconsin. He made the first one in 2009 with scrap lumber from an old garage door. It was designed to resemble a schoolhouse as a tribute to his mother, a schoolteacher. Todd was also a former schoolteacher who believed in small kindnesses. He modestly called his invention *a library on a stick*.

Many Rotary clubs around the world have Little Free Libraries in their neighborhoods. It's a good project for a club and is in keeping with Rotary's Area of Service, Literacy. A LFL generates excellent publicity for a club and enhances Rotary's image. It's an act of kindness that is characteristic of Rotarians. Consider building one for your club.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT 2023-24



Gordon R. McInally, a member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry, Lothian, Scotland, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International for 2023-24. He will be declared the president-nominee on October 1st if no challenging candidates have been suggested.

McInally says that senior leaders' ability to communicate directly with club members online will be one positive legacy of the changes Rotary has had to make. But, he adds, "face-to-face meetings remain important, as they encourage greater interaction."

The best way to increase membership is engagement, according to McInally. To better support clubs, he says, Rotary International, regional leaders, and district

teams all need to engage with them. Engagement through social media will reinforce Rotary's brand and showcase the opportunities that come with it. And, he says, engagement with governments, corporations, and other organizations will lead to meaningful partnerships. "With better engagement," McInally says, "we will grow Rotary both by way of membership and in our ability to provide meaningful service."

A Rotary member since 1984, McInally has been president and vice president of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland. He has also served Rotary International as a director and as member or chair of several committees. He is currently an adviser to the 2022 Houston Convention Committee and chair of the Operations Review Committee.


