The Silent Auction, in support of the programs of the Gundaker Foundation will again be held at the District Conference at the Racquet Club on Oct. 28-29. All proceeds will go to the Foundation to be used for matching grants, scholarships and the Youth Exchange program.

Each club is asked to provide at least one auction item. Members who contribute an item will be credited for Gundaker contribution. Any item you generously donate can be sent through your representative to the Gundaker Foundation.

# **Rotary Credit Cards Offer Outstanding Incentives**

The RI MBNA MasterCard is offering some very attractive incentives for clubs and our district. Every purchase using the card earns money for the Rotary Foundation. Since 2000, the Rotary Foundation has received over \$4 million from the card.

For each newly approved card, in which the cardholder spends at least \$75 in the first 90 days, the Rotarian will receive a check in the amount of \$25 payable to his or her Rotary club.

In addition, as long as the members put their district number of 7450 on the application, the district will receive \$10 for each of the first 7500 applications approved and will be used to help defray some of the costs of our District Conference.

Every member that doesn't already have this card, is urged to sign up. There is no annual fee for this card. Club Presidents will be receiving applications in the mail shortly.

### September is "New Generations" Month

In order for us to influence our community in the future, we must help young people today. Rotary District 7450 has a number of great programs to support young people. These include **Youth Exchange**, where your club can recommend a high school student to study in another country for a school year. Your club is invited to host a student from overseas. Our district provides a monthly program for all of our inbound Youth Exchange students. It is financed, in large part, by your generous contributions to the Gundaker Foundation. Eighteen clubs sponsor an **Interact club**, which is a high school club dedicated to service. As important as it is to sponsor such a club, it is more important that the Rotary club actually is involved in the Interact programs and that the students participate in Rotary club projects. Only four clubs in our district currently sponsor a **Rotaract club**, which involves young adults, over age 18, in service. Most Rotaract clubs are affiliated with colleges and universities. However, there is no reason why a Rotaract club cannot be started in the community. Our district also sponsors a **RYLA Conference**. RYLA stands for Rotary Youth Leadership Awards. The conference takes place at the Valley Forge Freedoms Foundation in February.

In addition, our district also sponsors the **Gundaker and Rotary Foundation scholarship programs**. The Gundaker programs include one for Undergraduates and one for Graduate students. Scholarships are generally granted between \$1,000 to \$5,000 but sometimes larger ones are granted. The **Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial and cultural scholarship programs** are for one year (\$26,000) and six months (\$13,000) respectively. These are for overseas study for graduate students.

Our district has set ambitious goals for these programs this year. We have set a goal of sending 15 outbound and 15 inbound Youth Exchange students in the next school year. It is not too early for clubs to look for students and homes to help us do that. We have also set goals of starting eight new Interact Clubs and 5 more Rotaract clubs, with at least one of those clubs that is not affiliated with a college or university. We have set a goal of sending eighty students to the RYLA conference in February and a goal of having a majority of clubs recommend at least one student for a Gundaker scholarship and a Rotary Foundation scholarship.

### **Meeting Improvements Will Help Your Club**

The main product of the Rotary Club is the Rotary meeting. If this is so, why do we spend so much time on everything else and pay so little attention to the quality of the Rotary meeting? If we paid a little more attention to that, we might have more satisfied customers (members).

The main item of the Rotary meeting is the program. Clubs that don't have regular programs are losing the main reason that people want to attend. Think about it...why should a person give 90 minutes of time to Rotary without an interesting and stimulating program? The 60% attendance requirement will only go so far. One hundred thousand members are leaving every year!

Here are some ideas that insure a more successful meeting and therefore, a more successful club:

- 1. Good and varied programs, scheduled well in advance.
  - a. Programs on Rotary projects and activities once a month
  - b. Community organizations occasionally
  - c. Occupational and classification programs occasionally
  - d. Speakers on issues of the day all sides of the issue by having different speakers attend on different weeks
  - e. Give speakers a full thirty minutes but start and end on time
  - f. Every speaker confirmed within 72 hours of the meeting
  - g. Club assemblies and business meetings no more than once every 2 months.
  - h. Always be prepared for a no-show speaker with a member ready to give an emergency program
- 2. Outstanding fellowship
  - a. An official greeter should always be assigned.
  - b. Guests and visitors are assigned to a member who sits with them, shows them where everything is and introduces them to the other members
  - c. All members friendly to each other clique tables strongly discouraged
  - d. Members arrive on time and stay until the end.
  - e. Good attendance by advertising each program to the members via e-mail each week.
- 3. The meeting is well run
  - a. The announcements are brief and to the point
  - b. Equipment is in place and ready banners are attractive
  - c. Enthusiastic welcome from the President
  - d. Business portion of the meeting is well organized.
  - e. Fines and happy dollars are brief
  - f. Information is given out in printed form or on your weekly newsletter at the table
  - g. Prayer is prepared in advance and suitable for a mixed audience
  - h. Every speaker comes with a brief but informative introduction.
- 4. The venue is suitable and food is good.

Follow these suggestions and you're sure to have a more successful club!

# Broomall, Newtown Square, Coatesville, Ardmore, Philadelphia, and Jos Nigeria Rotary Clubs want you to Join their Team!

Of all the issues facing people of developing nations, perhaps the greatest need of all is access to clean potable water. Water is the basis of life and without it we cannot survive which is why Rotary is encouraging all clubs to get involved with a water purification project. This is your opportunity.

For millions of people around the world, the only water they have access to is either polluted by man or spoiled by bacteria, viruses, and other parasites that would terrify the average American.

The people of Nigeria do not, in many cases, even have access to well water. Most of the inhabitants of Kwang Village Plateau State and surrounding villages must get their water directly from the river which is infected with Giardia, Typhoid, and other water born parasites. Bilharzias is so infectious that the small worm like creatures will bore into the locals' skin when they have only been exposed to the water for no more than twenty seconds.( The result is infection, pustules, and eventually the parasites move to the organs of the body causing internal bleeding, brain tumors, and death.)

It has been estimated that 2/3 of the inhabitants of Nigeria are chronically ill because of water born parasites and diseases.

Because of contaminated water and malnutrition, an estimated 50% of children will not live past the age five For those who make it past five, life expectancy is 40 years.

The plan is to provide them with a water system, and also include a water drilling rig.

#### How can you help?

- 1) Before volunteers can begin their work, donations are needed. This is a unique opportunity for our local clubs to do something truly important for a part of the world in desperate need. Local clubs have already donated between \$1,000 and \$6,000 each to become a "Partner Club." Private donations have also been received, but more is needed.

Just drink the clean, fresh water and once the bottle is empty, save it for the month of Oct.. Every day you must place a dollar in the bottle until the end of the month and then have your club send the collected funds to the project committee. Your fresh water bottle can bring fresh water to thousands in Nigeria!

#### **District Conference to Feature two Elections**

Our District conference will feature two elections which every club will able to participate in. The elections will take place at 3:30 PM during the opening session.

The first election will select our delegate and alternate delegate to the Rotary International Council on Legislation which will take place in Chicago in 2007. The council will decide many of the rules which Rotary will work under for the next three years. Delegates will spend a week discussing hundreds of proposals and deciding which ones to enact.

The second election will be for a representative and an alternate representative to the Zone Nominating Committee. This committee will nominate a person to serve on the Rotary International Board of Directors.

Two candidates have been nominated by their respective clubs for each of the two positions. They are Jeffrey Cadorette PDG, from the Rotary Club of Media and Mark McGill PDG from the Rotary Club of Coatesville. One of the above two gentlemen will be elected for each of the positions and the candidate with the lesser number of votes will be selected as the alternate. Each club will get at least one vote. Clubs will receive an extra vote for each 25 members over 25 (or major portion thereof). Clubs will need to have one representative at the conference at 3:30 PM Friday October 28, 2005 in order to participate.

#### Qualifications - Jeffrey Cadorette, PDG

He has been a Rotarian for 28 years with the Rotary Club of Media. Since being governor in 1998, he has been actively involved in the planning and the program of each Zone Institute held in Zones 31/32. He knows personally all of the potential candidates for Director and feels that his lengthy experience in Rotary gives him the perspective necessary to choose a Director who has the ability to keep Rotary vital into our next century of service.

He was a delegate at the 2003 Council on Legislation and learned much from the 7 days of interaction with over 500 delegates from around the Rotary world. In August of 2005, he spent 4 days in Evanston training with 50 Rotarians from around the world on Rotary Foundation Alumni matters.
