Often, members join local Rotary Clubs when their members reach age 30 and are no longer eligible for Rotaract.

Due to the hard work of Jane Williams PAG, and members of the Ardmore club as well as the members of the District Rotaract committee, we now have our first community based Rotaract Club. It is my hope that club or clubs will form community based clubs in other parts of the district in the coming years. I have in my possession an application for a Rotaract Charter signed by 17 young men and women who desire to form the "Rotaract Club of the Main Line."(I am told that there may be an eighteenth charter member.) I have signed the application, as required, in the space provided for the sponsoring Rotary Club. Should I deliver this to either of you or to Jane? I think the application now needs to go to District Governor Bob Lankin with a \$50 check from our Club, so that it can be forwarded to RI. I trust Jack Del Pizzo can get this check to you. Thanks Jack! Just let me know to whom I should deliver the application. Jane is, of course, expert in all this and may wish to share her advice. And I trust it is now time for Dave Dillon to order a Rotaract Banner - its purchase was approved by our Board. Thanks Dave!

I look forward to hearing from you on what you think is the best way for our Club to welcome and honor these new Rotaractors and to present them their Charter and Banner. I wholeheartedly support whatever you decide on this. Jane might be able to let you know how long it will take to get the Charter back from RI. Megan attended the volleyball event and is in a couple of the group pictures - I think you may have seen these. I believe that 15 of the 17 members were there - only two were unable to make it. And they already have other projects lined up for April and early May.

You have the admiration and appreciation of our entire Club for all your good work in leading us in this effort. The Rotaract Club of the Main Line will provide young women and men in our community to make a difference in countless lives - starting with their own.

#### **Report from the Rotaract Chairpperson**

Spring isn't the only thing that is bursting forth in District 7450! The Rotaract Program is alive and well and sprouting wonderful new growth! When we started the Rotary year on July 1 our district had four existing Rotaract clubs, at Manor College, Swarthmore College, West Chester University and Widener University. Since then the Rotary Club of Chesterbrook has sponsored a club with the Valley Forge Military College Cadets and the Edge Hill Rotary Club started a club at Arcadia College. Also, the Rotary Club of Philadelphia in cooperation with International House in West Philadelphia has initiated a new club that meets at International House for students at the University of Pennsylvania, Drexel University, Temple University, and for non-university-based young professionals in the West Philadelphia area. And very soon, the Rotary Club of Ardmore will request a charter from RI for a community-based club for 17 young professionals known as the Main Line Rotaract Club.

In addition, the District Rotaract committee is working with several other very interested colleges and universities to begin to build a base for Rotaract clubs there for the next school year. Some of the new clubs have already demonstrated the Service Above Self mentality. For instance, one of the new Arcadia Rotaractors traveled home to India over the holidays and took part in a NID against polio while she was there. And other members of the Arcadia club traveled to Mexico over spring break to help restore home devastated by the hurricanes of last fall. The newly-formed Main Line Rotaract Club fielded a volleyball team on Sunday, March 26 to raise money for Easter Seals (and came darn close to winning the tournament). GO ROTARACT!

Rotaract can be an enriching experience for your club as well as for the community in which you live. And the benefits to the young people you involve are a wonderful legacy to leave behind. Rotaractors and Rotarians are partners in service and in spirit. Thanks for considering ROTARACT!

# Clubs invited to submit applications for the Rotary International Public Relations Award

#### Summary

The purpose of this award is to recognize Rotary clubs that have generated increased awareness and understanding of Rotary through outstanding media coverage or public relations efforts. Competition and selection of winning entries take place at the district level.

#### Eligible nominees

Public relations activities that are initiated up to one year prior to 15 March are eligible for the competition. For example, to be eligible for competition in 2005-06, entries would have to relate to public relations activities taking place between 15 March 2004 and 15 March 2006.

#### Selection Process

District governors must submit the nomination form and supporting materials to Rotary International for consideration by a review committee appointed by the RI president. **Deadline:** 1 May to have the application in to your district Governor.

## What is your legacy?

Dear Amigos,

While thinking about this month's message, the fable about the Fountain of Youth came to mind. It was said to have the ability to restore youth, and those in the Middle Ages believed it existed. Juan Ponce de Leon and Christopher Columbus, among other explorers, sailed to what is now Florida, USA, in vain search of it. This legend has lasted the ages, and some still seek it out today.



Living forever in the physical sense is not possible or truly even desired. But to leave a legacy that lasts in perpetuity just might be the next best thing.

The Rotary Foundation's Permanent Fund enables Rotarians to create their own legacy to do good in the world forever. Because only a portion of the Permanent Fund's earnings — not the corpus of gifts — is spent each year, a gift to it will continue working in perpetuity. This means current and future generations of Rotarians will have access to increased financial resources to help meet urgent human needs through The Foundation's educational and humanitarian programs. Last year alone, US\$4.5 million in earnings were available for The Foundation's programs.

In 1928, long before the Every Rotarian, Every Year theme for the Annual Programs Fund, Past RI President and Rotary Foundation founder, Arch C. Klumph, wrote about the Foundation's endowment: "We are determined that the Endowment Fund shall not be unpopular. ... We truly believe that when each and every individual Rotarian understands this matter thoroughly and correctly, there will be few, if any, who do not participate, even though the sum may be extremely modest in amount."

I encourage every Rotarian to consider making a gift or commitment to the Permanent Fund. While some people choose to make an outright gift, others include the Permanent Fund in their final estate plans. I am impressed by the large number of Rotarians who have committed a significant percentage of their estate to the Permanent Fund.

The opportunity represented if every Rotarian creates a legacy with Rotary can't be underestimated. We would quickly surpass our next target of \$1 billion by 2025 and be able to fund a substantial program such as PolioPlus on a regular basis. We share a common creed in our Rotary membership. Why shouldn't we share and create a common legacy together? The Permanent Fund will keep the future of The Rotary Foundation's programs bright. Be a part of this newest Fountain of Youth initiative, and your legacy will live forever.

# Armenian Tree Project Donations to be Presented to Scholar at the District Assembly May 3

As we reported last month, Gohar Gyulumyian, an employee of the World Bank in Yerevan, Armenia and the winner of a two year Rotary Foundation Peace and Conflict Resolution scholarship to Duke University will address the members of Rotary District 7450 at the District Assembly on May 3, 2006.

In honor of her appearance, it is our plan to present her with Trees for Armenia, a program promoted by Frankford NE Club President Paul Bogosian. It is hoped that each club could contribute a four tree or eight tree cluster in her honor. The information for the trees is as follows:

Armeia is a country that is challenged economically and also with its natural resources. Rotary Clubs can be helpful with donations to the **Armenia Tree Project (ATP)**, which is an on-going **REFORESTATION** project to help redevelop this country's natural resources. Clubs can participate in this form of <u>Rotary International Service</u>, 'Trees of Hope': A single tree costs \$15, A 4-Tree Cluster costs \$60, an 8-tree Grove costs \$120, 35-Tree Arbor costs \$525, 100-Tree Woodland costs \$1500. Any contribution is welcome from 1 tree on up to a grove or more.

### Queen Elizabeth recognizes Polio Effort

<u>Polio eradication</u> was one of several worldwide health concerns that Queen Elizabeth II of the United Kingdom highlighted in her annual address on Commonwealth Day, 13 March. The queen said that with the global effort to eradicate polio as a model, the world can successfully tackle other diseases.

"Polio, for example, used to cast its shadow across many countries," the queen said in the speech she delivered as head of the Commonwealth, a 53-member organization comprising the United Kingdom, former colonies of the British Empire, and Mozambique. "Today, thanks to concerted international action, just a handful still need to eliminate polio. The same approach and commitment to other global scourges, such as malaria and tuberculosis other global scourges, such as malaria and tuberculosis, can achieve equally impressive results."

Quoting an African proverb to urge members of the Commonwealth to invest more in health care, the queen said, "He who has health has hope, and he who has hope has everything." McKinnon called for sustained political leadership to fight the disease. He told attendees at the event, including a representative of Rotary, that the fight against polio is part of the fight against poverty.

# Volunteer work inspired Peace Fellow's Journey to Berkeley

From her composure, you'd never know that Francesca Giovannini has worked in some of the world's toughest conflict zones. But as the young Italian woman tells her story, you realize she really is cut out for the calling that has taken her from the affluent setting of her native Modena, through bomb-blasted neighborhoods, to the studious serenity of a wooded college town in the United States.

Currently a student at the <u>Rotary Center for International Studies</u> in peace and conflict resolution at the University of California, Berkeley, Giovannini was introduced to a peace-building career through a volunteer assignment in her hometown in the 1990s. At the time, residents of Modena were struggling to absorb an influx of North African immigrants. "It was not easy to integrate them into the city," she remembers. "I was involved with some nongovernmental organizations that were promoting dialogue between residents and the new citizens."

Giovannini liked the work, and in 1995, the NGO International Volunteer Service sent her to plant trees for peace in Belfast, Northern Ireland. Two years later, she was volunteering with a homeless community in Berlin. In 2000, Giovannini worked in the Gaza Strip as project coordinator for the Italian foreign ministry and an Italian NGO consortium. Then, Un ponte per, an Italian humanitarian organization working in conflict zones, employed her as a desk officer for Lebanon, the Palestinian Territories, and Turkey. She sometimes traveled to monitor projects in those countries.

"I once had a very tough time in Turkey," she says. "I was sent there unprepared." Giovannini was arrested while on a fact-finding mission in Turkey's Kurdish region. Insurgents alleged that the national army had committed atrocities against civilians. Government officials, who had caught wind of the visit, held and interrogated her at length about her activities. Despite several such unsavory experiences, the Rotary World Peace Fellow says she never considered a career change.

"People that you encounter in these contexts — of war, civil strife, and so forth — are some of the best people you can meet," she says. "People become more profound in these situations because they don't know if they will be alive tomorrow."

Working in the Middle East taught Giovannini some important lessons about peace-building and conflict resolution. First, she says, peace agreements among governments or warring parties are a good start in resolving a conflict. But unless ordinary people, who often bear the brunt of violence, are involved in coming to terms with the conflict, the most carefully negotiated and elaborately written peace accord will fall short of actually ending war or bringing real peace

Giovanni is currently working toward her Master's degree in Peace and Conflict Resolution on a two year scholarship funded by your generous contributions to the Rotary Foundation.
