For Eric Balcavage, a chiropractor and member of the Concordville-Chadds Ford Rotary, learning of the lack of personal items for U.S. troops serving in Iraq became a family matter. Balcavage has a brother serving as commander in the 501st Airborne, 1st Battalion in Iraq.

When he heard about the situation, Balcavage decided to take action by starting the "Platoon Partners" campaign. He said he was "appalled" to hear the soldiers couldn't even buy things such as toothpaste. "They don't even have a PX where they can buy things. I e-mailed everyone on my e-mail contact list saying we need people to act as platoon coordina-

leaders in Iraq to find out who needed what. The campaign started Dec. 22 and by the second week in February 50 platoons in the 501st and the 509th airborne divisions were being tended to by sponsors acting as platoon coordinators. Balcavage estimates that to be more than 1,500 soldiers being helped getting toiletries and other personal items. The average platoon, he said, has about 30 members.

Some organizations, even municipalities such as Concord Township, have adopted platoons and set up drop boxes for donations of such things as toiletries and other personal item which are not easily available in Iraq.. Balcavage has also enlisted the help of the Chadds Ford Business Association. he told the group last week that many of the personal items needed have been sent and they are now working to supply some comfort items such as books, magazines and CDs along with the personal items.

Balcavage said the soldiers in the 501st and 509th are in particularly bad positions, being in the unprotected red zone. Seven soldiers recently kidnapped, four of whom were killed, came from those divisions.

That seminar was open to non-Rotarians. "Platoon Partners" was not the original name of the cam-

The orphanages are poor and overcrowded and over 20 percent of the children are HIV positive. She continues to collect supplies and clothing for the orphanages.



Training kicks off for teachers for CLE

District 7450-sponsored training of teachers in the Concentrated Language Encounter (CLE) methodology of teaching non-English speaking adults to read and write English took place at Holy Family University in Philadelphia March 28 to 31. Jim Stanton, presidentelect of the Frankford Northeast Philadelphia Club, was the Philadelphia contact person and PDG Barry Smith from the Rotary Club of Sandy Springs, District 6900, was the CLE contact person.

A presentation was made to the District 7450 District Conference in Atlantic City, N. J., last October. District Governor Marty Phillips invited PDG Barry Smith and Vivian to make a presentation explaining the methodology used to teach children to read and write using the CLE methods. This presentation led to the Holy Family University expressing an interest in becoming the learning center for the Concentrated Language Encounter program in USA.

A seminar was held Jan. 25 at Holy Family University in Philadelphia to inform interested people of the future of the program. There were 60 people in attendance and they were instructed on what would be presented in the training session planned for March 28 through the 31. Barry Smith, Jim Stanton and Vivian Smith gave the presentations. Holy Family University reconfirmed its desire to host this training seminar. Barry Smith, PDG Lloyd Whitfield of the Constantia Rotary Club in D9350 South Africa and PE Jim Stanton of the Frankford Northeast Philadelphia Rotary Club presented the training of trainers to train teachers to teach non- English speaking adults to read and write English. There were 16 teacher trainers and 25 non-English speaking adult students present for the four-day training to learn the CLE methodology. Both Barry and Lloyd had been trained in the CLE teaching methods in Bangkok, Thailand and have trained trainers and teachers in various С 0 u n t r i e

Local Rotarians who were trained to be teachers of this method were Felice Silverman from the Chesterbrook Rotary Club, Randall T. 
