#### Nine from District to serve on Rotaplast team in India

For many local volunteers, it is priceless. These are the Rotary members in this area who participate on the cleft lip and cleft palate teams of Rotaplast International. They serve as sterilizers, record keepers, transporters of patients, and people to hold the hands of a child or reassure a mom.

In the past few years Rotarians from

many District 7450 Rotary clubs have raised the money (it costs a total of about \$500 to provide surgery to a child), carried the boxes, and supported the doctors and nurses who change every child's life. For a child from a poor family, a cleft lip is a terrible scar to bear. To the Rotarians and medical team members, it is an opportunity to give that child a smile.

This year, the Rotary District 7450 Rotaplast team will be traveling from August 25 to September 10 to Nagamangala, India, in southern India near Bangalore. The team will leave Philadelphia Saturday afternoon, August 25, for a flight to San Francisco, where they will meet the rest of the team and pick up 45 crates of supplies and equipment which will accompany them to Hong Kong, Singapore and finally to Bangalore. Touch down in India is scheduled two days after departure, Monday, August 27, about 10 p.m.

Team members will be with the medical professionals in order to support surgery for about 120 kids. Long days start with arrival at a hospital about 6:30 a.m. and end when the final patient goes to his/her room about 14 hours later. It is long, hard, tiring work but toil that brings the satisfaction of changed lives and the development of new friendships.

Hospital and has organized and performed several foreign health missions. DGE Russ brought his family photos of his late step-father, past District Governor Edward R. O'Brien (1989-90), who started the deFuria Rotary tradition, and his daughter, Nicole, who attends Cornell University and is active in the Cornell Rotaract Club.

Russ and Dawn spoke about how Rotary is woven into the fabric of the deFuria family, and Yvonne captivated everyone with her enthusiasm for gathering her high school friends together to provide hands-on service in a variety of ways to families and individuals in their town. Dr. Bui recalled that several Rotarians would visit her high school Interact Club every week, "inspiring the students with their kindness, friendship, and commitment to service. Here are excerpts from the top essay by Heather MacMichael

"There are many places where you can use the Rotary Four-Way Test. This test consists of four questions you should ask yourself before making a decision. The four questions are: Is it the truth? Is it fair to all concerned? Will it build goodwill and better friendship? Is it beneficial to all concerned? The Four-way Test helps people to make decisions in their lives and it helps to build character.

"Is it the truth? Is it the truth to keep the wallet you found on your way home from school when you know it has someone's name and address in it? No, it's not.

### 7450 Rotarians invited to 60-club Rotary Project Fair in Quito, Ecuador in October

International Service is one of the Rotary's four avenues of service and every club is encouraged to participate in this valuable service to the peoples of needy nations. Use of Matching Grant Program is one of the ways to fund these international humanitarian projects. There are number of ways to learn about and participate in the projects your club may want to get involved. One of the ways to do this is by attending the project fairs in a foreign country. Rotary District 4400 of Ecuador is organizing its fourth Rotary Project Fair in October this year in Quito, Ecuador. The Project Fair represents a unique opportunity for visiting international Rotarians to meet the local fellow Rotarians, learn about their community needs and initiate projects to help the needy in Ecuador. All the 60 Rotary Clubs of Ecuador are participating in the fair. I attended the last three Project Fairs in Ecuador and was able to initiate and complete four Matching Grant Projects dealing with improving the educational facilities in four different areas of Ecuador.

Some of the benefits of attending the Fair are:

- Clubs can start or expand international humanitarian projects. Visitors will have the opportunity to see the project sites first hand and will get personally acquainted with their promoter fellow Rotarians. This Fair will represent the initial step to long-lasting and awarding Rotarian friendships
- International twin club relationships will be promoted. Visiting Rotarians will have the opportunity to see the cultural and artistic treasures of Quito. Visitors can take a carefully planned five-day tour of the Galapagos Islands, one of the natural wonders of the world which inspired Darwin to come up with his evolution theory. Other touring options include excursions to Amazon Jungle, site of Equator and Andean Mountains
- Participate in the social events that are planned for visiting Rotarians towards building more personal relationships.
- Chance to stay with Rotarian families during the visit to build up camaraderie.

economics or law at a university. Javier's hosts during his stay are Barry and Pat Hartz of Honey Brook.


