West Chester Rotary Club drive collects 6,000 books for Kenya

A Prepared Place, an ongoing project of the West Chester Rotary Club has collected over 6,000 children's books for Huruma School in Ngong, Kenya. Rotarian Charles Lyddane and his wife, Moreley, collected the books with the help of many individuals, churches and schools to send to the school which had no books.

Huruma Children's Home, which operates the school, is a children's orphanage located at the undulating slopes of the beautiful Ngong hills, about 25km from Nairobi, the capital of Kenya in East Africa. It is a relatively poor area, just half an hour from Kibera, one of Africa's biggest slums, where most

Volunteers collected, packed and palletized the books for shipping at Paoli Presbyterian Church. The church helped pay for the shipping and lent a truck to deliver the books as well. Among those helping at Paoli Presbyterian are Deb Ebling, Dr. and Mrs. Johnson, Rotarian Paul Woodruff and many other parishioners. Books were donated by The Episcopal Chapel at Valley Forge, Paoli Presbyterian Church, individuals, and school book fairs.

When looking for a cost effective way to ship the books, the club discovered Books for International Goodwill (BIG), a project of the Parole, Md. Rotary Club lead by Rotarian Steve Frantzich. BIG is an organization which ships thousands of books each year to countries all over the world. Steve Frantzich and his Rotary Club were most helpful and the books were delivered to Annapolis on a gorgeous weekend in June. They were packed in a container that day and left for Africa.

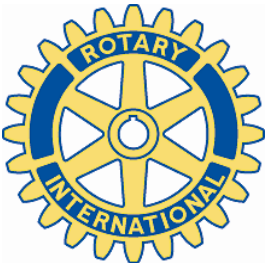
Six Rotary Peace Centers for International Studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution have been established by the Rotary Foundation at prestigious universities in five different countries. The focus of this master’s degree study is not on ending wars and conflicts but rather in prevention and mediation and compromise to make this world a better place in which to live.

A former Rotary Youth Exchange Student in Germany, Mayo is working with the Peace Corps as a project coordinator in KwaZulu-Natal, South Africa primarily to prevent the spread of HIV/Aids. Additionally, he has been functioning as a bridge between mutually distrusting groups of white and black South Africans and has been involved with a host of other humanitarian activities.

If selected, Mayo would like to study for the master’s degree in peace and conflict resolution at the University of Queensland in Brisbane, Australia, one of the worldwide Rotary Centers for International Studies.

The District 7450 Peace Fellowship Committee, chaired by PDG Tom McCarthy, said, Travis:Mayo “has a clear sense of mission and direction to make a positive difference for others in life. He has an extraordinary commitment to living the purposes for which these fellowships were established.”

Travis Mayo’s bachelor’s degree is in international politics from Penn State University and he has studied at the American International University of London. His career aspirations are to continue to work to build world peace and understanding.

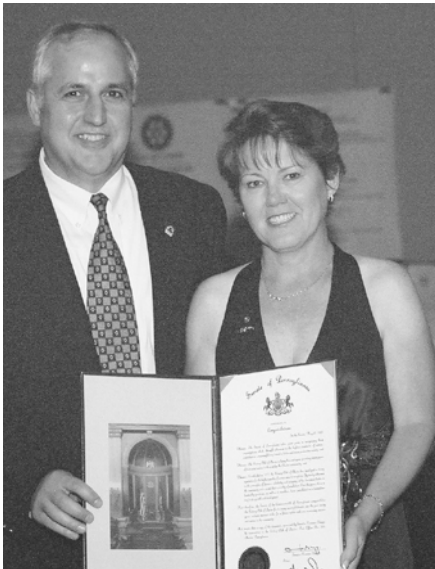
Chester Rotary Club celebrates 90th

The Rotary Club of Chester celebrated its 90th anniversary June 1 at Harrah’s Chester Casino and Racetrack. DG. Marty and Elaine Phillips, DGE. Russ and Dawn deFuria, DGN Joel Chesney and many past DGs were among 135 who attended the dinner. Also in attendance were past and present Chester Rotary Club members and their families and friends.

The Chester Rotary Club received its charter from Rotary International June 1, 1917. Dr. Augustus King, president of the Rotary Club of Philadelphia, organized the Chester Rotary Club. Under the guidance of E. Wallace Chadwick, an attorney and later a Delaware County judge, the Rotary Club of Chester was the second club in the District. The Chester Club sponsored three new clubs: West Chester in 1921, Swarthmore in 1937 and Chichester in 1969.

Emcee PDG Jeffry Cadorette assisted President Francy Cross in presenting Paul Harris Fellows to: Vahan Gureghian, Chester Community Charter Schools; Michael Carothers, son of John Carothers, past president of Chester Rotary Club and PDG for District 7630; and David Cross, community volunteer. Burroughs who served as president in 2002-2003 and is club secretary and chairman of the newspaper supplement and serves on several other committees.
