An estimated 7,000 bicyclists, including a team from the Philadelphia Rotary Club, will bike 160 miles from Cherry Hill to Ocean City N.J. and back September 29 and 30 to raise funds to help find a cure for multiple sclerosis that primarily afflicts young people in the prime of their lives - usually 20 to 45 years old. Some can't stand, some can't walk, others can't feed themselves, and others go blind, or die prematurely.

Rotary Leadership Institute slates three sessions for area this fall

The Rotary Leadership Institute will conduct sessions in and near District 7450 on three occasions this fall. The are: Harrisburg: East Holiday Inn, Saturday, October 20; Edison N.J.: The Pine Manor Wednesday November, 7; King of Prussia: Valley Forge Scanticon, Saturday November 17.

All Rotary Club presidents will receive the schedule and registration procedures. Registration is done on line on the website listed above. Each club will receive four certificates for clubs to recognize their future leaders by reimbursing their paid tuition once they complete the course. Clubs should present the certificates in September to give members sufficient time to register for the classes.

Three courses are offered by the Rotary Leadership Institute which must be taken in order. Each class begins promptly at 8 a.m. and ends at 3:30 p.m. All attendees will receive extensive educational materials, and two meals. The cost of attendance is \$90 per session and should be reimbursed by the club after the member attends the entire session. Those who do not register at least one week in advance will be charged an extra \$10.

The Rotary Leadership Institute welcomes any member who wishes to attend but the courses are designed for the newer members who are considered future leaders of your club. If every club had three or four non-Past Presidents graduate from the Rotary Leadership Institute, clubs would not have a problem identifying a suitable member to become President-Elect. The knowledge and enthusiasm which is generated by attendance in the sessions has been a big plus for the clubs themselves.

The program has been very well received due to the trained faculty and due to the carefully designed curriculum, which covers subjects such as club fundraising, successful service projects, the Rotary Foundation, membership development etc. The discussion format facilitates the sharing of ideas among participants.

Focus on Literacy

Academic rigor shines at Summer Writing Camp sponsored by Philadelphia Rotary Club

An unprecedented Summer Writing Camp for interested high school-age students was conducted by the Philadelphia Writing Project (PhilWP) in early July. Subsidized by the Rotary Club of Philadelphia, this initiative has been an unqualified success. The rigorous curricula ("Writing for a Reason") was focused on perfecting writing skills that included organization, capturing the audience, plot de-

velopment, transitioning, creative style and grammatical accuracy.

This pilot program enrolled students 25 from all around Philadelphia and classes were held at the High School for the Creative and Performing Arts. which donated classroom space and the use of its computer lab. The pupils were challenged to write and share poetry, research and create Op Ed pieces, and generate autobiographical and memoir materials. There was a great deal of editing and rewriting

and sharing of their work by the students.

"What impressed me about seeing this project in action was the structure and intensity that surrounded the learning activities," noted Philadelphia Rotary Club's Joe Batory, an educational researcher and a former superintendent of schools, who visited the program while it was operating. "All of the students were academically engaged and receiving plenty of personal hands-on guidance and expertise from the PhilWP staff as well as many opportunities to create and interact. This PhilWP learning model is excellent," Batory added.

"We are very grateful for the generosity of the Rotary Club of Philadelphia in providing the funding that made this effort possible for some wonderful young people," said Vanessa Brown, director of the Philadelphia Writing Project. "It is our hope that we can now refine and enhance what we have learned about this concept of a Summer Writing Camp and

> extend our efforts to reach many more students in the future."

> "With the emphasis on literacy initiatives by Rotary International, I think that our club's subsidizing of this camp was a great fit into the overall Rotary agenda," according to Lou Mosca, president of the Rotary Club of Philadelphia. "The participating students were impres-

sive and the PhilWP teacher leaders are clearly knowledgeable and resourceful in teaching the craft of writing."

The closing activity for the Summer Writing Camp was held at the Graduate School of Education of the University of Pennsylvania. Past Philadelphia Rotary Club president Frank Hollick, current president Lou Mosca, and literacy chair Joe Batory represented the club as the students summarized some newly-found writing expertise before an audience that included many proud parents.

Main Line Rotaract Club raises \$5,000 for Water for People at mini-golf and skee-ball tournament





A total of 69 literacy related activities were reported by 12 clubs in the 2007 Rotary Literacy Awards. All clubs that submitted activities will receive recognition for their efforts. Clubs with 10 or

more activities will qualify for the Zone Literacy Award. This year three clubs are Zone Award recipients: Longwood Rotary Club with 11, Central Delaware County Rotary Club, and Philadelphia Rotary Club. Congratulations to all the clubs that submitted their certification forms and especially our zone award recipients.

One of the most popular literacy activities in the District is the Dictionary Project. This is a special program in which clubs buy dictionaries for complete class-

rooms in at-risk schools. Special group pricing makes this project very affordable. Ten of the total activities are related to the Dictionary Project.

Also popular were programs and speakers

related to literacy. Librarians, ESL teachers and adult literacy providers were among the seven presenters in this category. Reading to and/or mentoring students in schools also had seven activities. The new and innovative Concentrated Language Encounter (CLE) had five activities. CLE is a unique program

> to teach English language students to speak and read English. Many other activities were undertaken by clubs to encourage reading and engage their communities in literacy.

Two Interact Clubs purchase ShelterBoxes

By Dawn deFuria District 7450 Interact Chair West Chester East and Rustin Interact Club fundraisers for 2006-2007 raised enough money to purchase three Shelter Boxes for District 7450.

West Chester East staged its annual Battle of The Bands in April 2007 and Rustin sponsored a

lock-in at their school in June. The lock-in was their first event for the school and was very successful. Rustin Interact Club was chartered in May 2007 and is sponsored by the Glen Mills Rotary Club.

A ShelterBox is a large, rugged green plastic container that holds a 10-person tent and a variety of other emergency range equipment. The contents include thermal blankets, insulated ground sheets or sleeping bags that can be used in cold conditions, waterproof ponchos and bin bags, cooking pans, utensils, bowls and mugs, collapsible water containers and water purification tablets, a tool kit (hammer, axe, aw, pliers, hoe

head, trenching shovel, rope, etc) and a small children's pack containing drawing books, crayons and pens. The cost of the Shelter Box is \$1000. and is funded entirely by donations.

Every ShelterBox is individually numbered and can be tracked to its final destination. Within 48 hours of a disaster, ShelterBox can get a team and a box to the scene The concept of a ShelterBox was developed by ex-Royal Navy search and rescue diver Tom Henderson, the charity's founder and general manager. His is a Rotarian in the Helston-Lizard Rotary Club in the UK and the Shelter Box project was their Millennium Service Project.

In March 2002, Tom approached the Rotary

Club of Lakewood Ranch: near Sarasota, Florida, to become the primary administrator for the Shelter Box Program in the United States, known as ShelterBox USA. ShelterBox provides emergency supplies to victims of disasters, which often result in huge numbers of people left homeless such as earthquakes, hurricanes, wars, floods, landslide, tsunamis, volcanic eruptions and typhoons. The Shelter-Box is committed to providing humanitarian aid on an on-going basis to people around the world.

The Rotary Club of Helston-Lizard officially launched the ShelterBox project in April 2000. As of January 2007, ShelterBox had sent aid to 31 countries and provided shelter for 500,000 people.

Rotarians in action

The Kennett Square Rotary Club at Longwood has been working on restoration of Martha's Dream Home in response to a request from Good Neighbor Ministry.

The historic home, in the family of retired policewoman Martha Brown for over 75 years, dates back to before 1840 and was in need of repair to its exterior. Good Neighbor Ministry approached the Rotary Club in 2006 for assistance in the restoration work.

Upon an inspection of the original log cabin home, it was determined there were decayed areas and gaps in mortar chinking and water was leaking into the house and wood timbers were in need of repair. The Historical Commission was especially concerned that the house retain its original exterior look.

The Rotary Club agreed to provide workers and much of equipment required for the job which was . David Scott was in charge of
