Rotary ShelterBox on job



Young child is tied to ShelterBox on cart of family left homeless by May 3 cyclone in Myanmar. Rotary delivered the first ShelterBoxes to the area May 8.

A response team of four specially trained volunteers moved into devastated areas in Myanmar's delta region to distribute the first or more than 800 ShelterBox containers May 8, five days after the powerful cyclone hit the area.

ShelterBox, a grassroots disaster relief organization, was among the first, if not the first organization, to begin delivering help to the cyclone victims,. after Myanmar's military government stalled aid from many international groups. Over 100,000 are reported dead with many thousands homeless in the wake of the cyclone.

Rotary Clubs worldwide provide over one-half the support for ShelterBox which provides tough green plastic boxes with a 10-person tent and enough equipment to house and provide for a large family for six months.

GSE team member Jason Kline reports on visit to Tropea:

GSE team sends travelogue from Italy

Today (May 11) is Giancarlo's birthday (and Mother's Day).

The dawn broke grey on the Tyrannian Sea, but it was less windy than yesterday. Everyone apologized for the lack of sun, however we know from speaking with our families that it's much warmer here than it is at home. Off we went with Peppino and Giancarlo to Tropea

where we were met by a huge contingent of Rotarians from the Tropea Club including some of their children. We met Club President Luigi, as well as Giuseppe, Peppino, Raffaela, Pino, Giaccomo, Ernesto, and his son, Lorenzo.

We first walked through the old city of Tropea, which was largely built in the 5th century. We viewed an island with a castle on it called Santa Maria del Isola. It used to be isolated by water 2 cen-

turies ago, but now it is connected to land.

We saw the Jesuit church, where the priest told us he had visited the St. John Neumann shrine in Philadelphia. There was a large bomb hanging on the wall inside of the church. It was dropped by an American bomber during World War II along with six other bombs. They did not detonate, and it was believed to be a miracle performed by Madonna, so it was hung on the wall. They had to dig it out of the ground from 5 meters below.

The town was full of a festive feeling because it was the First Communion day for many young people, plus they were celebrating Festa della Mamma (Mother's day).

Tropea is quite beautiful, and you should visit. If you come, it is recommended that you visit in June or September. There are seven islands off the coast. You can sail to them. In Tropea, there are 42 restaurants. We had a fantastic lunch in the country at a very secluded restaurant known only to the

locals where the vegetables, fruit, meat, olive oil, and wine are all produced by the proprietors. This area is known for its wine production. We were fated with multi-antipasti, (eggplant, olives, ricotta, anduja), primi (pasta), and grande secondi (meats and sausages), and molte vino Calabrese (lots of local wine). We enjoyed the feast and the crowded

noisy ristorante immensely. This was one of the best meals thus far.

On the way back to town, we stopped by Giuseppe's house to pick up our schedule for the next five days, and enjoyed tartufo (ice cream) and a nocino (walnut liquor) made by Raffaela's mother. From there, we went off to look at the sea from different panoramic spots. It was gorgeous. The tur-

quoise-colored water was so clear that you could see the bottom. You could see Sicily from the coast. We then walked along the beach. We then went back to our hotel (albergo) for an hour's rest before a large dinner.

At dinner, some of the dishes included smoked swordfish (yum!), cefallo (local pesche), spaghetti with fish, swordfish rotini (rolled swordfish, baked in cheese and olive oil). The wine tonight was white (vino bianco), and was called Grecco. It's very typical in Calabria. I believe we had it the first night we were here as well. Try it if you can find it – it's quite good. We also had more tartufo. We have become tartufo connoisseurs, and are making plans to learn how to make it when we get back.

Tomorrow we are off to Nicotera and Palmi. We are working our way South, before heading up towards Napoli. Hopefully we can drop by an Internet café so that we can publish this for you.

RI approves \$284,657 grant to West Chester Rotary Club for Kenyan project

Paul Woodruff and Charles Lyddane of the West Chester Rotary Club are thrilled to report that they have received the official announcement that the Rotary Foundation Trustees have approved a grant of \$284,657 for "A Prepared Place" and other orphanages near Nairobi.

The money will come in the form of a 3-H Grant which will enable the program to facilitate the adoptions of children orphaned by the HIV AIDS epidemic.

The task now is to raise \$43,000 from local contributions. The total amount of money going to the project is \$327,567

This latest grant continues the West Chester Rotary Club's six-year effort to assist the people of Ukambani, Kenya in partnership with the South Nairobi Rotary Club.

The program initially involved delivering medical equipment to a clinic, then sending a medical library with the help of University of Pennsylvania and John Hopkins Medical School, collecting and sending 6,000 books for children with help of a Maryland Rotary Club, and more recently a multi-phase water project which collects and delivers water to a medical clinic, primary school and market place for potable, sanitary and agricultural uses in Ukambani, Kenya.

Phase one of the project, costing \$90,000, captured water from one natural

spring, one transmission line, two storage tanks and several water kiosks and cattle watering troughs. The second phase, with a \$60,000 price tag, tapped into a second spring; included a new transmission line, additional storage tanks and animal watering troughs.

Tapping the additional spring has increased the quantity of water for the community's use, thus helping more people. In addition to serving the clinic, school and market-place, the new water line will provide a year-round supply of clean water for villagers within walking distance. The villagers supplied land, labor and mud brick for the project.

As the safe water supply becomes available, drip irrigation will be introduced and water will be available for livestock. Better nutrition and clean water will greatly improve the health of the population, and excess food produced can be sold to meet needs requiring cash.

The entire project is designed to encourage families to adopt children from orphanages in Nairobi, such as "A Prepared Place".

Rotary sending ShelterBoxes to Myanmar

Each Shelterbox also contains a multi-fuel stove, water purification kit, blankets, tools, mosquito nets and other basic necessities.

The first shipments of containers is expected to benefit more than 10,000 survivors. The team of trained volunteers will work in cooperation with local organizations to line up transportation and decide where the ShelterBoxes will do the most good.

According to ShelterBox representatives in Northbrook Ill., "Rotarians were able to penetrate areas the country's military rulers had placed off limits by working with Rotarians from Myanmar".

Another 1,000 ShelterBoxes were reported shipped by the middle of May.



Contents of Shelter-Box include tent for 10, stove, cooking utensils, hand tools and water purification supplies for six months.

ShelterBox USA executive director Beth

Palmer in Lakewood Ranch, Fla., reports a "spike in online contributions" and says her phone "has been ringing off the hook " as Rotarians want to donate funds. ShelterBox offices in other countries have reported similar increases.

The Rotary Foundation announces a call for applications for the 2009-11 Rotary World Peace Fellowships (RWPF) and January and June 2009 Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies (RPCS) Program sessions. The deadline for completed applications to be submitted to The Rotary Foundation is July 1, 2008.

The Rotary Centers for International Studies program offers fellowships for master's degree study fields related to peace and conflict resolution. Beyond academics, Rotary World Peace Fellows also gain practical skills in conflict resolution appropriate to their individual careers.

Up to 60 Rotary World Peace Fellows each year enroll in the six Rotary Centers based at leading universities in five countries: International Christian University, Japan; Universidad del Salvador, Argentina; University of Bradford, United Kingdom; University of Queensland, Australia; University of California-Berkeley, Calif., U.S.A., and

Duke University and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, N.C.

The Rotary Peace and Conflict Studies Program is a professional development program in Bangkok, Thailand, through which up to 30 participants embark on three months of intensive study instructed by some of the leading specialists in the peace and conflict resolution fields, specialized curriculum has been crafted to capitalize on the experience of both participants and lecturers while balancing theoretical and practical learning.

Ideal for busy professionals, the customized program helps promising leaders expand their global outlook, strengthen their negotiation skills, and ultimately make a positive impact on future peace and conflict resolution efforts worldwide.

Still time to recruit new Rotarians

Have you ever imagined what Rotary would be like if every Rotarian met President Wilf's membership challenge this year and brought in one new member before year's end? Imagine, if you will, Rotarians from every club in the world -- North America, South America, Europe, Asia, Australia, all of them, rich clubs, poor clubs, big clubs, little clubs, break-

fast clubs, big clubs, little clubs, breakfast clubs, lunch clubs, dinner clubs, cocktail clubs, e-clubs, Saturday Clubs, all of them - bringing in one new Rotarian. Just imagine:

Rotary International would have over 2.5 million members. But more importantly our Rotary Foundation's annual giving would receive more than \$200 million each year and program awards would exceed \$60 million in Matching Grants, over \$10 million in District Simplified Grants, nearly \$30 million for Ambassadorial Scholarships and nearly \$8 million for Group Study Exchange.

We would have over half a million Interactors and a quarter million Rotaractors. And our impact on world hunger, health, humanitarian and educational projects could synergistically make all the difference in world peace and understanding.

Far-fetched? Unreasonable? Not on your life! When President Wilf challenged each of us to get one new member this year, he knew exactly what he wanted us to do. The big question is "Did we meet the challenge?"

Well, the good news is that many Rotarians in many clubs have met the challenge and will show a net gain June 30.

Many clubs evaluated the way their clubs did business. Many opened their doors to a more diversified membership. Many evaluated the way their communities know them, some using

> public relations material and grants to broaden their presence in their communities. Many learned more about the Rotary Foundation and became more involved in Foundation Programs. And many clubs hammered out a membership plan at the beginning of the year, involved every Rotarian in the club and carried out their vision.

But there are those clubs who continued to be satisfied with the status quo. Their meetings are now as they were 15 years ago, the average age of

their membership has risen and their attendance has dropped. And their Rotary community activities have dwindled or combined with other agencies in town.

Yes, those may be the two extremes, but its never too late. If yours is one of those clubs which hasn't doubled in size this year, then there's work to be done. Involve every member in developing (and therefore subscribing to) your plan. Evaluate your community needs, how your club can improve its attraction factor and your activities, and incorporate the results into your club's written membership plan. Then simply follow the plan, checking on progress at every

District Incorporation Resolution Approved by District clubs

With 44 of 54 District 7450 Rotary Clubs voting, 42 clubs have approved the resolution to proceed with steps to incorporate the district and two clubs voted against it. RI requires two-thirds of a district's clubs (36 to 54 for District 7450) to approve to proceed. For the past few months, a group of Rotarians under the chairmanship of DGN Al Marland has been converting the "District Resolutions" into proposed bylaws that, once approved by the clubs, will become governing rules for the district. When a final draft of the bylaws is ready for review, a second group of Rotarians will be asked to review the draft to ensure compliance with Pennsylvania incorporation laws and RI requirements. Once completed, the bylaws will be presented to clubs for ratification.





Rotary Exchange students comment on impact

District 7450 Rotary Exchange students who attended the Multi-District Conference at Skytop last month were asked how the Rotary Exchange program helped Rotary International reach its goals of world understanding and peace.

Amanda Cury from Brazil, hosted by the Wells family and Avondale West Grove Rotarians, the answer was respect."You have to understand that

there are different things in you culture and your host's culture. You have to respect that. You don't have to agree or disagree, but you have to respect... By doing that you are understanding and creating a more peaceful world."

Out of the mouths of babes... if we all just understood that message of respect throughout our world, wouldn't it be a better place?

Victor Sant'Anna from Brazil, hosted by Patti family and the Broomall Rotary Club, was asked. "What have you learned about yourself while on exchange?" His reply: "Independence and how to manage by myself.was always some one in my house to clean or to pay for me to do things. Now I have to do that"

Benjamin Latour from Belgium, hosted by West Chester Rotary Club

and the Ebert family, said he found United States "warm and open". He explained he arrived in the District not speaking a word of English and fells his experience has only shown, "how Americans accept others easily." A good message for us all to hear.

Every student had an individual perspective on this or her experience and what it has and will do

for them in the future. I found the most amazing remark was made by Maite Imirizaldu Martinez from Spain, hosted by Kennett Square Rotary and the Newman family. She had listened to a "Rebound", one who was an exchange student and returned to his or her home country in District 7430, who earned a teaching degree and teaches Spanish in a local high school. After her compelling presentation about

RI discontinuing club administrative software

Ed Futa, RI general secretary has notified DG Russ deFuria that as of July 1, 2008, RI "will no longer provide club and district administrative software. When RI purchased the software in August 2003 and re-branded it as RI-CAS and RIDAS, the intention was to provide clubs and districts with an effective tool to assist with the weekly administrative burdens faced by clubs and districts that would also eventually integrate with Rotary's own on-line business application, the Member Access Portal (MAP).

"As your general secretary, I continually work to ensure that your membership dues are used in the most effective manner. After five years, we have found that RI-CAS and RI-DAS is only being used by a very small percentage of clubs and districts worldwide. Lately, it has become evident that

supporting and developing RI-CAS/DAS is diverting key resources away from other critical organization projects.

"It is just not in our organization's best interests to continue to provide access to, distribute, or support this software. Clubs and districts may still use the software after 1 July 2008. However, at the start of the new Rotary year, support and new versions will not be available.

"An even smaller number of clubs and districts use an online version of the software. On 1 July 2008, we will no longer support the online version of RI-CAS and RI-DAS and access to the online service will not be available after 1 September 2008.

"Thank you for your understanding of this necessary change to your resources."





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
