



A 5-year-old Iraqi boy, who was brought to Pennsylvania late last year by Rotarians from District 7450 and 7430 to receive medical attention to correct a life-threatening condition, was guest of honor at the Concordville-Chadds Ford Rotary Club meeting last month at Maris Grove in Glen Mills.

Mohammed Kareem Moh Alshehabi was born without an opening to eliminate solid waste, a condition which requires

> tion. These are the best tools that we have to shape and change lives around the world.


Time is growing short to make your contribution for this Rotary year. We are working hard to reach our goal for both and have not vet done so.

Rotarians continue to support ShelterBoxes

Rotarians in District 7450 continue to raise funds for the purchase of Shelter-Boxes for victims of the earthquake in China and the cyclone in Myanmar.

DG Russ deFuria has asked Rotarians to respond to both emergencies with donations to ShelterBox USA to provide a 10-person tent and equipment to house and provide for a large family for six months.

Each ShelterBox costs \$1,000.

Club Projects

Longwood Rotarian Dave Scott has offered to match funds for three Shelter-Boxes in addition to one he has purchased to help relief efforts in Myanmar and China. Each \$500 in donations from club members will be matched by Scott.



Ardmore Rotary Club president John Douglas asked members to pledge funds to match a \$1,000 contribution from the Ardmore Rotary Foundation to send two ShelterBoxes to Myanmar. As a result, the members pledged \$1,3000. The extra \$300 pledged will be added to funds raised at this month's Sizzle which raises funds for International Service for more Shelter-Boxes.

Douglas also reports former Ambassadorial Scholar Belkys Lopez, who is working to establish a Rotary Club in Abyei, Sudan and help the people during the latest crisis, sent the following:

Hi,

I've received excellent news yesterday. ShelterBox has donated 100 boxes!!! I spoke with Tom Henderson, ShelterBox CEO yesterday. After sending him information on Abyei and our project, he quickly wrote back donating the boxes. Now we are quickly working out the logistics with ShelterBox for the transport of the boxes. I must say I was surprised at the quick reply on the request but I believe that this has much to

The immediate response of 800 ShelterBox boxes to China following the May 12 earthquake reached parts of the Sichuan area May 27. The four-man ShelterBox Response Team on the ground split the first consignment of boxes into two lots of 100. Another 650 tents left ShelterBox headquarters May 28 with 650 slated to leave May 29 and 700 due to leave immediately from the tent manufacturers warehouse in Shanghai. USA ShelterBox reports, "We now know that approximately 500 Boxes sponsored by U.S. donors have already been sent to China! Additionally, over 150 U.S.-sponsored ShelterBoxes have been deployed to Myanmar. Thank you to all of our volunteers and supporters for organizing this response, and for your continued support. Additional deployments are, as always, contingent on additional donations received."

The 100 boxes will be able to accommodate 1000 individuals. Our plan is to quickly settle families so that they are productive during the crisis and may quickly make their transition...The ShelterBox contribution is a big morale boost. In times of crisis it's wonderful to see how people rally to help. We are very grateful. I can't wait till they are delivered.

GSE team reports month-long trip to Southern Italy a 'life-changing experience'

On Monday, June 2, 2008, the District 7450 Group Study Exchange Team to Italy returned to Philadelphia after a month-long exchange to Southern Italy. The team was hosted by District 2100, consisting of 73 Rotary Clubs and 3,800 Rotarians in

the provinces of Campagnia and Calabria.

Team members were Martina Martin, an attorney with Askot, Weiner & Cohen, Philadelphia, and sponsored by the Rotary Club of Newtown Square; Nick Fortunatus. executive director of the Media Youth Center, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Media; and Jason Kline a software manager and geographer with Navteq, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Kennett Square. Team Leader was Jane Williams, marketing consultant, and a member of the Rotary Club of Ardmore.

Nick Fortunatus reports, "The opportunity to experience a different culture so intensely for an extended period of time was truly an extraordinary lifealtering experience. Being able to visit and be entertained by Rotarians in their homes and in their clubs, to observe their culture, to travel with them to their treasured local sites, museums, churches, monasteries and tourist areas was absolutely amazing. We even were taken to their favorite out-of-the-way restaurants that featured local cuisine. These were places a tourist would never have found or experienced. In fact, at one local restaurant in Campagnia,

famous for its different kinds of pizzas, I even made one myself."

Martina Martin adds, "The vocational experiences were very interesting for me. We visited several courts, spent a lot of time with Rotarians who are attorneys, and I even stayed with a family of lawyers. We discussed the differences between our rule

of law and I found it extremely fascinating that their rulings are based on statutes and not case law as in the U.S. In Naples, we visited the Tribunale, a new complex of buildings entirely dedicated to the court system for the city and the region appeals court. There we observed both civil, criminal. and appeal proceedings, including one group of men being arraigned on drug charges."

Jason Kline says,
"It was an amazing
experience to be in
the country from
which my grandparents immigrated,
and to visit the very

same areas where they lived was very special. To spend time with the Italians who stayed behind was also wonderful. It was an experience that a tourist would never have. Being a wine maker and an avid gardener, I particularly enjoyed visiting the winery of Giancarlo Calise, District Governor for 2100, and the local agricultural school in Campania where the wine tasting proved to be a real delight and wine was wonderful. We even had an impromptu piano concert by one of the teachers at the school. I also enjoyed visiting a kiwi farm, a strawberry and melon farm,

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Rotarians make difference in boy's life

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The mission was planned after Rotarian Eric Balcavage learned about the boy's condition after he beceived a photo of Lt. Col. Balcavage with the boy on his lap. Eric Balcavage and his mother, Carol, worked through colleagues and a network of medical personnel who agreed to donate their medical services after which Lehigh Valley Hospital agreed to provide the surgery at no cost.

Rotarians in the two Districts 7745 and 7430 helped with finances not only for the boy but his escort and for the guardian who was responsible for him while in this country. In addition, past RI President Bill Boyd donated the tickets for the flight to the U.S.

The boy underwent two successful operations during his stay: one to create an opening for excretion and a second, six weeks later, to close up his colostomy and ileostomy.

Last month's visit to Concordville-Chadds Ford Rotary Club was to say good-bye to the youngster and to give the Rotarians the opportunity to wish him well.

The Rotarians also gave a standing ovation to Amel Yahya of Lehigh County, a Muslim mother of three sons who was the boy's guardian during most of his stay. She has family in Kuwait and one of her sons served in the Marines in Iraq. She stepped up and took over the guardianship after the woman who accompanied the youngster from Iraq wanted to return to Iraq after a short time in this country.

The youngster left soon after the Rotary Club luncheon to return to Iraq and his father, brother and pregnant stepmother in Iraq.

Lt. Col. Balcavage, who was stationed in Alaska upon his return from Iraq recently was reassigned to duty in Louisiana with his unit.

News from District 7450 Rotary Clubs

The **Rotary Club of Paoli-Malvern-Berwyn** was blessed with a sunny day May 29 for its 11th annual golf outing at Westover Golf Club, Jeffersonville. The outing was rescheduled from May 9 when a storm blew in and caused a postponement.

A total of 90 golfers shared in the fellowship and fun, and helped make this the biggest fundraiser in PMB's history with golfers from Ardmore, Chesterbrook, Haverford, Kennett at Longwood and Newtown Square Rotary Clubs. Golfers from Kennett Square Rotary Club scored best and took home \$500 for the charity of their choice.

Swarthmore Rotary Club expects this year's Fun Fair will raise around \$21,000. Since its inception in 2002, the annual Fun Fair has raised over \$100,000.

Philadelphia Rotary Club receives \$2,500 'matching grant'

The Rotary Club of Philadelphia has received a "matching grant" of \$2500 to support the 2008 Summer Writing Camp conducted by The Philadelphia Writing Project (PhilWP). The Philadelphia Rotary Foundation committed \$2500 for this project last December.

"We are very grateful for the generosity of the Rotary Club of Philadelphia and District 7450 in providing the funding that will make this effort possible for some wonderful young people this coming summer," said Vanessa Brown, director of The Philadelphia Writing Project. "It is our hope that we can refine and enhance what we have learned about our pilot Summer Writing Camp project last year and improve and enhance our efforts with students in the summer of 2008."

A 2007 pilot program, funded by Philadelphia Rotary Club in 2007, enrolled students from all around Philadelphia at the High School for the Creative and Performing Arts which donated classroom space and

the use of its computer lab. The pupils were challenged to write and share poetry, research and create Op Ed pieces, and generate autobiographical and memoir materials.

"What impressed me about seeing this project in action was the structure and intensity that surrounded the learning activities," notes Philadelphia Rotarian Joe Batory, an educational researcher and a former superintendent of schools, who visited the program while it was operating. "All of the students were academically engaged and receiving plenty of personal "hands on" guidance and expertise from the PhilWP staff as well as many opportunities to create and interact."

Lou Mosca, Philadelphia Rotary Club president, points out, "With the emphasis on literacy initiatives by Rotary International, I think that our club's subsidizing of this camp is a great fit into the overall Rotary agenda and District 7450's matching grant is a great addition."

Jane Williams concludes, "This Group Study Exchange program is one of building bridges between cultures but also about building friendships. The Italian Rotarians welcomed our Team with open arms and were so warm, hospitable, welcoming, and generous that we cannot begin to repay them. Our hope is that the many invitations we extended for them to visit us here in the states gives us the chance to reciprocate.

During the month we visited or spent time with Rotarians in 27 different Rotary Clubs in District 2100 and made many friends in Italy. We started out on the beautiful East Coast of Italy in Catanzaro, and then moved to the West Coast (just 35 km away) where we visited Rotary Clubs based in the many beach towns and resorts. From there we traveled to their District Conference in Paestum, a site of the most well preserved Greek ruins outside of Greece.

Their district conference was well attended with about 350 people and we had an opportunity there to give a short presentation about ourselves and our district to the General Assembly. Then we visited Avellino (inland), the Amalfi coast, Capri and spent the next weekend at the all-Italy Rotaract conference on the island of Ischia. More than 200 Rotaractors

from every district in Italy attended and we had the opportunity to see a display of some of the service projects of various clubs. Two Rotaractors we met are going to the convention in LA and hopefully will meet up with District 7450 Rotaractors who will be there.

From Ischia we traveled by boat to Naples where we spent the final week visiting the amazing and extensive archeological and art treasures of the city as well as most of the 9 Rotary clubs located in the city of Naples.

As I search for one word to describe the GSE experience, I am having difficulty finding one that is adequate enough, so let me list some words that seem to fit: enriching, important, mind-expanding, exciting, rewarding, enlightening, worthwhile, stimulating, exhilarating, significant.


