PHF Recognition Points

Effective July 1, 2009, the following changes affect Paul Harris Fellow Recognition:

Foundation Recognition Points may only be transferred for transactions of 100 points or more.

Individual Foundation Recognition Points will expire upon death of the donor or the death of the surviving spouse of a Major Donor (US\$10,000+)

The individual donor will be the only person authorized to transfer Foundation Recognition- ion Points. If it is a club account only the Club President may authorize the transfer of points; if it is a district account then the DG may authorize the transfer of points;

Paul Harris Fellow Medallions will be available for purchase from Rotary's Distribution Center at a cost of US\$15 each (includes shipping)

.PHF certificates and PHF lapel pins will still be provided gratis by The Rotary Foundation.

Rotarians provide clean water for Belize village

The Living Waters for the World and The First Presbyterian Church in Oak Ridge have been very involved in the training aspects of the project. In March, 2009, I attended five

days of training at "Clear Water U" in Oxford Mississippi.

My focus was on the health and clean water issues that a rural area must be concerned about. The other individuals that traveled to Belize with me are from Oak Ridge Presbyterian Church: Dan Terpstra, Chuck Hadden and Dave Mullin. All have been trained at Clear Water U. Two Rotarians from the San Ignacio Club, Sheree and Aki Fukai, were invaluable to our project. They have been in correspondence with us from the beginning. The Fukai family lived and worked in the

Chicago area until retirement when they moved to Belize.

Of the six individuals (3 Rotarians and 3 Living Waters of the World) each of us had our area of focus.

Dave was the chief engineer of the water purification system itself. He knows how to put a puzzle together. We brought the pipes and parts with us in large suitcases. Aki was the engineer of the conversion from an old fashion well to an since the village does not have electricity.

Chuck and Anne were the community relations coordinators. Our job was to develop the

relationships with the children and families and provide the training that they needed to operate the system. We were training a group of mothers and they, in turn. would be training others in the community.

The village needed to organize a Water Board or work with the Village Council to establish the rules and procedures to keep the system running once it was operational. The most important goal for us was to be sure it is sustainable once we leave.

When Dan and Sheree were in Yalbac, they were helping whereever we

needed extra hands. They also spent time exploring other villages testing water and talking with the communities. Sheree is the chair of the Rotary District 4250 Water Board Committee for Belize. They were looking for another village that would benefit from a similar system. They found one called "More Tomorrow".

Sunday, May 3, we had a grand celebration with a large turn out from the Yalbac community. The government's water representative and his assistant came to check out the system. Quite a few of the San Ignacio Rotary Club members joined us and a local eco-resort owner came.

The children sang "Use this Water" in English and Spanish; Anne read a poem and gave out certificates. We had a few speeches, and shared clean and pure water with everyone from the well.

Airport ad campaign in spotlight at RI Convention

This past December, for the second year, Rotary District 7450 was awarded a public relations grant by Rotary International to pay three-fourths of the cost of two different diorama ads at the Philadelphia International Airport. This latest advertising campaign, which ran from January through May, 2009, will be highlighted at the 2009 Rotary International Convention in Birmingham, England.

"We wanted to have two back-lighted dioramas (giant slides) that are 43" high and 62" wide," said Joe Batory, District 7450 public relations chairperson, who wrote the grant and developed the



ad content. "The airport advertising company (Clear Channel) has a price for each diorama's display space of \$1500 per month but because of Rotary's many humanitarian initiatives, we

were able to bargain two dioramas for the price of one each month, which was a factor in them awarding District 7450 a PR grant. Our two dioramas were placed in the USAir baggage pickup area which is by far the best spot at the Philly airport (a USAir hub)

because it is the busiest and especially because people have to wait 10 to 15 minutes for their bags to arrive there," according to Batory.

The basis for the ads was the "Humanity in Motion" materials from Rotary International. "We picked two themes from the many available on their free discs and developed some custom wording about Rotary and District 7450. Rotary International's staff helped edit this copy after we created what we wanted. And we had great cooperation from Clear Channel," Batory continued.

The project cost about \$8000 for five months of airport advertising.

RI provided a \$6000 grant and District 7450 added about \$2000. "And we have had two dioramas for the price of one in a heavily trafficked airport venue for five months. Small



wonder that RI wants to share our success story with other Rotary Districts around the world at the convention," Batory concluded.

Longwood Rotarians rally support for 'Power Up Gambia'

Kathryn Hall, a true hero, shared a powerful presentation to update the Longwood Rotary Club on her self- "Power Up Gam-

bia" project this month.

During a visit a couple of years ago as a college student, she observed the newly built Sulayman Junkung General Hospital in Gambia had insufficient energy to provide adequate lights and water. This resulted in the deaths of many patients, including children. Kathryn was so impacted by this situation that she dedicated all of her free time to raising \$300,000 for a solar-generated power system to provide electricity and water to the hospital - a goal achieved in February of this year.

Kathryn has embarked on a new project to raise funds to install a solar system at the sat-

ellite Somita Clinic and is seeking an additional \$95,000.

Longwood Rotarian Rodney Ciafre has challenged his fellow Rotarians to match his up to \$500 donation for this effort.

Happy Dollars collected at the June 9 meeting, went toward Rodney's donation challenge. Dollars raised will be donated in addition to \$1,000 commitment made earlier by the Longwood Rotary Club Foundation.

West Chester DownTown 'Fridays' pack lunches for Safe Harbor homeless shelter

On a sunny day in May, fellow Rotarian Phoebe Kitson-Davis and I were "buzzed" past the secure front door into Safe Harbor, a homeless shelter in West Chester. We placed large boxes stuffed with lunch bags on a table. After a couple of similar trips, two of the four men waiting outside the shelter on benches offered to help us carry additional loads until 100 bulging lunch bags—each decorated with a Rotary wheel sticker, and filled with a sandwich, banana, water bottle, fresh carrots, potato chips, a package of cookies, a peppermint and a napkin—had been unloaded from the back of the van and delivered to Safe Harbor. "We sure appreciate you ladies doing this," one man said with sincerity.

Rotarians of the Downtown "Fridays" club have stepped in to fill a present and growing need in West Chester: providing food for homeless people who otherwise might not have enough to eat that day. Club members raised funds and received a District Simplified Grant to purchase enough supplies to make more than 800 lunches. They are preparing and delivering them while the Safe Harbor kitchen is closed for building expansion—a project that is an unfortunate sign of hard economic times, a high unemployment rate and home foreclosures.

The lunch bag project, however, has demonstrated the best of Rotary: the involvement of family in Rotary, the fun that accompanies fellowship with a purpose, and visibility of Rotarians' willingness and ability to help the community.
