DG Batory meets first woman Rotarian at RI Convention

DG Joan Batory met DGE Shirley Whitlock, the first woman inducted into Rotary, during last month's RI Convention in Montreal. DGE Whitlock is a member of the Claremont (Calif.) Rotary Club. The Claremont Rotary Club inducted the first women in the 1980. When Rotary International refused to allow them to induct the women, the Rotary Club took the case to court. The U. S. Supreme Court heard the case and, in 1988, Rotary was ordered to admit women based on the Commerce clause of the U.S. Constitution.

PDG Mark McGill conducted the recognition ceremony and made presentations to outgoing 2009-2010 DG Al Marland. In addition to PDGs deFuria, Brock, McGill and McCarthy, PDGs Arthur Judson, Jack Grant, Hogie Hansen, Joel Chesney, and Bob Lankin were present and were recognized for their contributions.

In her remarks, DG Batory emphasized the RI theme for 2010-2011: "Rotary International President Ray

Klinginsmith has given us a wonderful four-word emphasis about who we are and what we do as Rotarians: 'Building Communities ... Bridging Continents.' Indeed, our Rotary Clubs are building communities and bridging continents and must continue to do so. We will do it with every book we hand to a child....With every shelf we nail into place in a food bank...With every water well that we provide a village in another county...With disease preven-

tion and medical operations...With natural disaster relief efforts and so many other humanitarian efforts around the world... With every computer we give to a school or orphanage...With every child, with every adult whose lives we touch though our Rotary service. Mother Theresa once said that she "just did what she could, wherever she was, with whatever she had. "Her words echo what Rotarians do every day. We will never know the true impact that Rotary efforts to help others may have, but we can be assured that the tiny ripple effect that each of us makes will enrich the life of at least one individual somewhere, sometime, somehow."

DG Batory concluded, "I will leave you with this thought. The sun rises and the sun sets everyday and life goes on. And in the end you are what you have done. And so, in the end, it will not matter how much money you have, what kind of car you drive or what other wealth you have. What will matter is what you have given to others."

Give the gift of Rotary membership

We give of our time, treasure and talents to Rotary. What do we get in return? We get the opportunity to help others for the good of the world – in our community and around the globe.

So why not look at helping another person to join Rotary as just that – giving someone else an opportunity to enjoy the things we have received via Rotary membership?

Each Rotary Club has its own way to support membership growth. There is no one way that is best. However, some things work better than others. Here are a few that you and your club might consider:

- Doing a community needs assessment. This is done by a small group of four or five members going to various non-profits and county agencies to find out how Rotary might help them. You might find some good speakers this way as well. This effort will increase your Club's visibility and make you more relevant to your community in how you reach out to make a positive difference.
- Have an open house event/dinner. Invite prospective members and their spouses as well. Often a commitment to Rotary is made by both spouses due to financial and time commitments.
- Ask your Club to make a commitment to invite and bring in at least one new person to your meetings per year. Offer them a card with your Club's meeting time and place and Club member's name inviting them (in case the invitee arrives

early). Include your Club's website address so that they can learn about your Club before they visit.

- Send thank you notes to visitors. Invite them to come back again. Often it takes two to three meetings for a prospective member to feel ready to commit to membership.
- program. If you would like to know more about this, contact the District webmaster and ask for a speaker referral. As a member of the District Membership Development Committee, I am one of those speakers. This mentoring effort is critical to making a new member feel important and to feel like an active, well -accepted member. Studies have been done to show that lack of a personal connection to the Rotary Club and its activities is a key reason for leaving Rotary within three years. I think most would agree that it is easier to keep a member than to find a new member.

Clearly there are many ideas and most of them are excellent. It takes a serious commitment from many members in the Club to get membership development to be a real priority. Inviting new people to join Rotary should be in your Club's top five goals each year. Otherwise a shrinking club will just make those who work hard have to work harder to provide service, fellowship and leadership for all. Rotarians are generous and good natured people.

Let's grow Rotary and make the world a better place.

Rotary Foundation Speaker's Bureau offers Club programs

The District 7450 Rotary Foundation Committee offers a speaker's bureau to better communicate with local clubs and members.

Local clubs can request speakers from each sub-committee – Alumni, Annual Giving, Grants, Group Study Exchange, Rotary Peace Fellows, Permanent Fund, Polio Plus, or Scholarships.

To make a request, go to the Rotary Foundation section of the District 7450 website, www.rotary7450.org. When you select "Speaker Request", a request form will be displayed. Supply contact and meeting information, three potential dates, and select the sub-committee that is of interest. A "Comment" area allows you to be more specific about your request.

When the form is submitted, the request will be forwarded to Russ deFuria, who will contact the appropriate speaker. The speaker will contact you to confirm the arrangements.

Committee members look forward to sharing their experiences and enthusiasm with all District 7450 Rotarians.

Report on Haiti **Bristol Rotarian on the job**

The members of Bristol Rotary Club hadn't seen Fred Ramirez for a couple of months, and with good reason.

President Jim Sell asked Fred to give the Club some insights into his work in Haiti during a recent meeting.

. "Haiti," Fred began, "is not a country. Haiti is a place." And one that is very hard to get to these days. Fred has been there off and on since the tragic earthquake, and reported it is hard to comprehend the tragedy of a country which has 150,000 dead and a sea of hundreds of thousands of blue tents passing for shelter.

"Once you are there and working in the zone, you feel anytime

you go home that you are letting them down," he explained. "You've left patients there. You've left colleagues working."

Fred was there to set up a medical clinic, but nothing is that simple. "Everything is needed. You go with a medical corps, and find you need social services. You need schools."

Fred is building an outpatient clinic, but now he's also building an orphanage for about 30 children he's taking responsibility for. Fred says many organizations, both religious and civil, are there helping—even the Palestinian Authority is on the ground.

At the time of the meeting, he was home for two weeks to gather medical supplies, but getting the supplies to Haiti is another logistical challenge, which is why many NGOs are shipping supplies to the Dominican Republic and trucking them into Haiti.

Fred reported sadly, a lot of relief items go into the black market instead of helping the people they were meant for. "What you have to do is take the supplies in yourself and distribute them yourself," he's learned. Fred promised to give us updates on the situation in Haiti.

PDG Arnold Graf recently moved to Charleston, South Carolina. He lost his wife, Rose, this past Rotary year. Graf, who was DG in 1990-1991, Rotary Foundation chair in 2005-2006 and senior advisor to the Foundation Committee in 2006-2007, says he wants "to stay in touch with all the Rotary family." 
