
Honored for service



Frankford-Northeast Rotarians give ShelterBox \$1,000

Frankford-Northeast Philadelphia Rotary Club president Thomas Finnegan presented Jim Ryal, Pennsylvania representative for ShelterBox USA, a check for \$1,000 to purchase a ShelterBox following Ryal's presentation about ShelterBox at the November 30 meeting of the Rotary Club.

ShelterBox originated in England in 2000 as a program developed by a Rotary Club to mark the millennium. Its mission is to provide humanitarian aid worldwide in the form of shelter, warmth and comfort for people displaced by natural and other disasters.

Ryal, a Haverford Township Rotarian, explained ShelterBox instantly responds to earthquakes, volcano eruptions, floods, hurricanes, cyclones, tsunamis and conflict. "The decision to deploy to Haiti (following the January 12 earthquake) was made twelve minutes after the earthquake struck," he reported.

ShelterBox has provided aid to survivors of 140 disasters in more than 70 countries. Its green box has

been said to stand out as a symbol of hope in a landscape of disarray. Its boxes, assembled in England, provide shelter for an extended family of up to 10.

In the last decade, a total of 96,537 boxes have been distributed. The boxes include water purification supplies, thermal blankets, insulated ground sheets, a multihued stove, cooking utensils, tools, waterproof ponchos, a children's activity pack and mosquito nets. The tents are strong enough to withstand 60-knot winds. The total weight is 110 pounds, and the value is \$1,000. "We want a family of ten to be able to sustain themselves for six months," Ryal continued

ShelterBox has affiliates in Australia, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, the Netherlands, New Zealand, Norway, Switzerland and United States.

During 2010, ShelterBox delivered 38,329 Shelter-Boxes around the globe. A total of 27,217 boxes have been sent to Haiti. ShelterBoxes also helped victims of the torrential rains in Columbia, flooding in Mexico and Pakistan and a tsunami in Indonesia.

Test time! Clubs need to evaluate procedures and programs

We are at the halfway point in this Rotary year, and now is the time to test the strengths and weaknesses of our Clubs. Perhaps a strange idea for some Rotarians, but how else will we learn how the activities and programs of our respective Clubs match up to those of other Clubs in our districts – and around the world?

Therefore, I encourage all Rotarians – not only the Club officers – to become involved in evaluating their Clubs during the month of January.

The Presidential Citation program for 2010-11 has been designed as a score sheet for all the Avenues of Service. It also is a checklist for many of the activities and programs conducted by most Clubs. Club presidents are required to complete the score sheets and submit them to their district governors by 31 March 2011 for their Clubs to be eligible for the Presidential Citation awards. The scores should be shared with all Club members either as written reports or as presentations at Club meetings. Starting work on the Presidential Citation test in January will provide an opportunity to correct any discovered deficiencies in Club activities before the submission deadline of 31 March. It also will cause the Club leaders to notice that a new Presidential Citation with Distinction award is available this year for Clubs with a good balance of activities in all Avenues of Service.

This year I am recommending that all Clubs review their practices and procedures to see if they are truly best practices or merely traditional practices. Annual evaluations of our Clubs are certainly best practices, and more Rotarians than usual need to be involved in the evaluations for their Clubs.

The Presidential Citation score sheets are a good place to start the process. How else will we know if our Clubs really are becoming "**Bigger, Better, and Bolder.**"

<u>As Rotary volunteer</u> PDG Bronson attends Brazilian Rotary Youth Exchange Conference on Rotary trip to Brazil

During five weeks (October 18 through November 21, 2010), I had the opportunity to travel to many places in Brazil and be hosted by Rotary Clubs in Pernambuco, Paraiba, Minas Gerais, and Sao Paulo states.

While the primary purpose was to teach English and familiarize students with American customs, culture, and language use, it also provided the chance to visit and speak at many Rotary clubs, see Rotary service projects in action, and learn a significant amount of Portuguese.

This experience began in District 4500 in the northeast of Brazil and was facilitated through PDG Leandro Araujo. After visiting and speaking at clubs in Recife and Joao Pessoa, I arrived in Patos, Paraiba where I spent

the next two weeks hosted by the three Rotary Clubs of Patos and living with a wonderful Brazilian family where only Portuguese was spoken.

While visiting Rotary projects in the morning, learning the local language, and meeting with classes

at the school of the Rotary Club of Patos Norte and other public and private schools, I spent the afternoons and evenings (until about 9:30 p.m.) teaching classes at Cultura Inglesa. I also had the opportunity to visit with the students of the Rotary-supported AABB program for disadvantaged youth and the APAI Center for physically and mentally challenged young people.

After Patos, I went to Belo Horizonte and then Ribeiro Preto where I participated in the Brazilian Rotary Youth Exchange Conference. This was followed by a whirlwind of cities and experiences with home stays and educational opportunities

in Sao Paulo, Amparo, Guaruja, Aguas de Lindoia, Vinhedo, and Campinas. During this time I spoke at more than a dozen Rotary clubs and held classes at Wizard Ingles com Lideranca, Success Idiomas, Colegio Objetivo, and Skill Idiomas along with Campo Norte, the community school operated by the Rotary Club of Sao Paulo Norte, and many other public and private schools.

This experience was devised and organized through the Rotary Volunteer program but without any assistance from the Rotary Foundation. These five weeks helped reemphasize the role of Rotary in providing service to those in need, training the young leaders of tomorrow's world, and providing cultural opportunities through Rotary Youth Exchange. It also reinforced the critical role of the Rotary Foundation in moti-

vating individuals and clubs to work constantly and creatively in order to assure a better tomorrow throughout the world.

One of the things that I had the opportunity to do at every school was to teach the English

> version of the song, "Deep and Wide" to hundreds of children. The lyric of this little song only has seven different words, "Deep and wide, deep and wide, there's a fountain flowing deep and wide." The students were told that this fountain is the fountain of love and brotherhood that we all can drink from through the fellowship and universal service of Rotary.


