Message from DG Joan



March is Literacy month.

UNICEF estimates that one billion children and adults, approximately 15 percent of the world's population, lack basic literacy skills. According to the International Reading Association, 113 million children in developing countries alone are not in school and not learning to read. And worldwide, approximately 500 million women are illiterate, making up twothirds of the adult population that cannot read. There are non-reading individuals

in every community in our District as well.

In 1985, Rotary International declared basic literacy to be necessary to the development of peace. As a result, more than one-half of the world's 33,000 Rotary Clubs address the full range of literacy challenges. We know that illiteracy not only comes at a high cost for the individual, it comes at a great cost to our society as a whole. About 65 percent of the inmates in our area prisons cannot read.

Consider: The annual cost for a prisoner in Pennsylvania is \$32,000. The cost for a dictionary is \$1.00 The cost of a Rotary Club visit to read to children and have children read to them is \$0!

We Rotarians know that early literacy training is critical to the success of a child's education. That's why our Clubs work to encourage and build reading skills at an early age.

How does a Club put together an effective project?

- By identifying literacy problems in their community or the larger world by conducting a needs assessment
- By applying for matching grants for international projects and District Simplified Grants for community projects.
- By supporting county-wide literacy programs in our 6 county area.
- By believing that we can make a difference in our community by creating readers who can contribute to society.



<u>Targeted to Rotarians</u>

RI issues warning on scams

Rotary International has received numerous complaints of-mail scams targeting Rotarians and has issued warnings about the following scams:

An e-mail scam claiming that the recipient has emerged the winner of a Rotary International Cash Grant Program, chosen by a random selection system. The recipient is asked to fill in information in order to receive a cash prize of £250,000. The subject line of the e-mail is ROTARY CLUB GRANT OFFER!!

An e-mail scam regarding a fake Rotary Mega Lottery in which sender, who claims to be from Rotary, informs recipients that they won a sum of US\$950,000 in an October charity. Be aware of the sender, Mr. Connie Sall

(RotaryMegaLottery@clubmember.org). Rotary Mega Lottery does not exist and is a scam. An e-mail regarding a promotional prize by fake department at The Rotary Foun-

An e-mail regarding a promotional prize by take department at The Rotary Foundation concerns sender, who claims to be the manager of a Promotions/Prize department, and informs recipients that they won a lottery promotion, with a lump sum payout of \$1 million. The e-mail gives out a number LP/26510037/10. The sender uses the name Jerry J. Blake.

A scam regarding employment opportunities at Rotary International has emerged on Craigslist. Be aware: any and all job listings asking to contact a "HR Manager Charles Baldwin" are fraudulent and are NOT related to RI career opportunities. Look out for the scammer's Yahoo messenger ID: charlesbaldwin2008, as well as, any e-mail coming from the address of hr@eaglescomputers.com. The e-mail scam reads: "Hello, The entire board and members of The Rotary Foundation wishes to inform you that your resume has been received and we find you qualified for the job. An interview will be conducted online and that would be the final process regarding this job. This is a work-from-home job offer from Rotary International NB: You are requested to download and set up a Yahoo Instant Messenger Account (http://www.messenger.yahoo.com) and add the online HR Manager Mr Charles Baldwin on his yahoo i.d charlesbaldwin2008. The duties and functions will be explained briefly by Mr. Charles Baldwin. Salary:\$20/Hour Benefit Apply Fulltime/ Parttime Positions are Open. An e-mail from "UFAAIDS" requesting personal information in exchange for a job position as a "U.S. UFAAIDS-Rotary District 8080-Donations Co-ordinator."

A request via e-mail for a \$5 donation to list your Interact Club on a Web site. This Web site is not affiliated or in any way associated to Rotary International.

Rotary International does not solicit funds through e-mail, nor does it ask that personal information be updated by e-mail or other electronic means. RI encourages Rotarians and Rotary Clubs to avoid becoming victims of such scams by deleting any e-mail that appears suspicious.
