Message from DG Bonnie



I do feel as though I should begin as Garrison Keiller of Lake Wobegon fame starts his weekly stories: "It's been a good week in Lake Wobegon." I would say, "It's been a great month in District 7450!"

I expect to have many "high points" in this year as District Governor. But one of the most fun experiences has to be throwing out the first pitch at "Rotary Night at the

Phillies." I practiced with my coach, Bob Curran, on the advice of several past district governors who said, "It's not as easy as it looks." And as my coach said, I only get one chance to do this. There is no do-over. And isn't that like so many things in life? Sometimes we'd like to rewind the tape and try again.

Last year at "Rotary Night at the Phillies" Mike and I worked with the Polio subcommittee of the District Rotary Foundation handing out brochures about Rotary and polio, offering the opportunity to contribute to the fight for polio eradication. It was an interesting study of people — or more specifically, Phillies fans. These fans entered the stadium on a mission; and their mission was not to be waylaid by one of us and asked to support polio eradication in another part of the world. If they didn't make eye contact with us, maybe we wouldn't notice they were walking right past us. Depending on the age of the fan, some had never heard of polio and most assumed it had already been "cured."

If only it were so. But we are THIS CLOSE. Year to date there have been 267 new polio cases in the world – compare to last year's year to date number of 545. For 2010, the total number of cases was 1,349. In 2011 there has been only one new case of polio in India! These are great numbers. But Burkina Faso has its first case in 10 years – not good news. Thanks to the Internet, I can tell you Burkina Faso is a landlocked country in west Africa.

Polio immunizations must be done on a "do-over" basis. There are currently 10 percent of Americans who are not immunized against polio (11 percent of Canadians). A carrier can connect the dots in this world economy we have. When all the countries are reporting no new cases, we must continue to immunize.

Practice pays off; Bonnie pitches ball to Phanatic!

Almost 1200 District 7450 Rotarians and guests were among the sellout crowd of 45,800. No word if the pitch was a ball or strike; however the Phanatic still eagerly congratulated Bonnie who was photographed with her battery mate after the ceremonial pitch. The Phillies and Cole Hamels lost the game, 2-1 which was played in two hours and 38 minutes. Rotary's Polio Plus was a winner to the tune of \$10,260 which was the result of the sale of 1149 tickets by Rotarians. That brings the total funds raised for the Rotary Foundation by District 7450 participation in "Rotary Night at the Phillies" to close to \$220,000.

"The challenges include foot races, broad jump, ball throw and more. Buchanan explains, "Nothing dangerous or too strenuous. Just lots of fun for the children and parents."

Night of Dreams' promotes reading and writing skills


At three years old, Isabella turns pages, answers questions about pictures and has an attention span to enjoy half a dozen children's books. Other children, some who are as old as six or seven, struggle with the same skills.

Learning differences or lack of daily reading traditions because of parental illiteracy, inadequate nutrition, a family history without reading, or poverty and inability to afford books prevent children from developing skills necessary to succeed in school, later employment and life. In other cases, students lose skills during summer vacation.

The Rotary Club of West Chester Downtown - with the help of a few members of the Glen Mills-Thornbury and West-town-Goshen Rotary Clubs—is working to solve those challenges locally and hosted a "Night of Dreams" at St. Agnes Day Room in West Chester July 29.

They practiced reading and writing skills with fami-

lies who are new to this country and new to reading and speaking English. Evening highlights included: drawing shapes and writing letters in plates of chocolate syrup; reading and receiving new children's books (a project of the Westtown-Goshen Rotary Club) by Bruce Larkin—"Rotary Clubs Help People" and "Carol is a Rotarian," and watching Randy Evans' antics paired with the book, "Dressing for Work" by Larkin, about a clown preparing for work.

Club members also read to children at the Parkesburg Mobile Food Pantry while their parents completed paperwork and picked up food.


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
