Last month I announced the grand total of contributions from District 7450 to PolioPlus. Rotarians Jane Williams and Hogie Hansen felt the number provided by RI was low. They did a little detective work and found that RI's database only goes back to July 1, 1988. Checking the archives from 1985 to 1988 produced a new number which is half million dollars higher:

The total donations to PolioPlus from District 7450 is (drumroll, please) \$2,015,482!

78 young people attend 2012 RYLA weekend



The Longwood Rotary Club once again fulfilled the "Service Above Self" motto as part of a recent fundraising effort for the Brandywine Valley Watershed Association's annual "Polar Plunge." President Rosemary Gill showed up in a chicken costume in order to avoid the now semi-official role of the Longwood Rotary Club president to lead members in the plunge. Gill chose instead to watch.

Through a spirited membership vote, using dollars as ballots, past president Dave Haradon replaced Gill in the plunge. Haradon, who was the first Club president to take the challenge in 2009, was joined by some Club members and members of the Unionville/Chadds Ford High School Interact Club in taking the plunge in the Brandywine River.

Haradon said, "It was pretty cool!" For the third year in a row the combined efforts of Longwood Rotary Club and the Unionville/Chadds Ford High School Interact Club members had the largest group and total contribution for the Brandywine Valley Watershed Association and received the "Golden Plunger" award. This year's proceeds will be over \$1063. Participants must enter the 32degree Brandywine River, cross over and back while also "plunging" their head under the freezing water at least once.
