Message from DG Bonnie



What an amazing month it has been, as this Rotary year concludes. We are just home from Rotary International Convention in Bangkok, Thailand. Each week it is an amazing experience to be in the presence of Rotarians at their weekly meetings. Sometimes I even get to attend my own amazing club, the Longwood Rotary Club.

But as amazing as local meetings are, to experience the network of Rotarians at the Club and local com-

munity level, Rotary on the <u>world stage</u> is Rotary at its best. My hope for all Rotarians in District 7450 is that you can experience Rotary beyond your local Club, into the District, the Zone, and finally Rotary International. You will say as I do, *I am so proud to be a Rotarian*.

The opening ceremony at each Rotary International Convention is the Parade of Flags. Over 200 countries and territories participate, with Rotary youth carrying the flags and banners, announced to everyone (with a graphic of the globe on a giant screen with a star to help us place each country and territory). The order is alphabetical so the tension is high when USA is announced. Everyone is proud of his or her country, and you can't help jumping to your feet and clapping. There were three new countries announced this year where Rotary has opened up. And the last banner in the parade is the "Flag That Unites Us All" – the flag of Rotary International. And it is a united convention. All Rotarians, all with the same core values, all with Service as our middle name – just many cultures and languages brought together under one gigantic roof. This year attendance was one of the highest: between 35,000 and 40,000 participants.

Rotary membership is held in such high esteem in many countries. Several delegations had matching suits and jackets made for the occasion. The Princess of Thailand opened the convention to much pomp and tradition. We celebrated the eradication of polio in India; we remembered the ties between Rotary and the beginnings of the United Nations. We heard about water and sanitation projects, microeconomic grants to poor women, human trafficking in all parts of the world and the schools established to rehabilitate and serve the victims. We heard from earnest people all over the world, working people to people trying to solve these human issues to make life better for someone.

Join with me and the Club presidents of 2011-2012 Sunday, June 24, as we celebrate this amazing Rotary year. We will congratulate Rotary Clubs, Interact Clubs, and Rotaract Clubs which have earned Rotary International, District 7450 and Zone 32 awards and certificates. District 7450 will present one of the highest honors in Rotary International, the "Service Above Self" award, to one of our District's Rotarians. There are only 150 Service Above Self awards given yearly (out of 531 Districts). We are honored to have one of these prestigious awards to present. And lastly, we will induct the new leadership team, under the direction of Dave Ellis, to continue towards a new Rotary year of service, friendship and making the world a better place.

District seeks host families for Rotary exchange students

Ardmore Rotarian James Hall, member of District 7450 Rotary Exchange Student Board, reports 12 students are scheduled to arrive in the District for the 2012-2013 school year. The student's range in age from 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 18 years and are juniors and seniors in high school.

Hall said students usually live with two different families in the same school district during their year here. He said, "This allows the students to experience different family situations and eases the commitment to the families.

"We only ask that host families open their homes, and accept these children as their own." Hall pointed out and listed some of the responsibilities of host families during the student's stay."

They include:

- "Meeting your student on arrival at the airport and welcoming them as part of your family;
- "Working with the student to master the language;

- "Involving the student in obligations similar to those established for your own family members;
- "Helping the student meet Rotary obligations, which include attending Rotary functions;
 - "Exploring opportunities for the student to meet others through school, church, Rotary Club or community activities;
 - "Providing a safe environment for the student and ensuring the student's safety."

Hall emphasized that potential host families will be interviewed by a Rotarian, complete a background check and attend a host family training session. "They DO NOT need to be Rotarians themselves or be of a specific age. We've had families that have

children in school and young families without children. All families are eligible; with or without children; young or "older"; employed or retired. An open heart, an open mind and a willingness to share are all that are required, he added.

Foundation Committee seeks team leader for Korean trip

Through the program, teams of professionals exchange visits between paired areas in different countries. They will give presentations to Rotary Clubs and other groups about their home country.

The Rotary Foundation provides a round-trip air ticket, and local Rotarians in the host country provide meals, lodging and group travel in their District. Team leader and members pay for their personal and incidental expenses, as well as travel insurance.

Rotarians interested in applying for Team Leader should be active Rotarians in their local club and in the district, be able to commit to being away for all 4 weeks, be committed to building a strong team including language lessons for the exchange and be willing to assist the incoming GSE team during their stay and promote GSE throughout the district.

Phillies and Gundaker team up to raise \$3200





RI Convention:

Over 38,000 Rotarians from 181 countries convene in Bangkok

The Rotary International Convention was held in Bangkok May 6-9 at

Impact Muang Thong Thani, bringing more than 38,000 members from 181 countries and geographical areas Thailand for its 103rd annual convention. The Rotary convention is often described as "mini United Nations" because of its internationality and multiculturalism. DG Chamnan Channuang, District 3360, covering Northern Thailand and Laos, compiled a report of the convention for Rotary Club of Chiang Mai North newsletter.

Opening ceremony: Praise from Princess

Her Royal Highness Princess Chulabhorn, representing His Majesty the King, graciously presided over the opening ceremony. In her address she



thanked Rotarians for their good work around the world.

"Rotary International is well-known the world over as a public charitable organization distinguished for its public

service to humanity and for its tireless strive for public good. They include relief work for those who fall victim to natural disasters, campaigning for improvement in quality of life, as well as for the promotion of world peace."

"I'm truly impressed by the unity of all Rotarians in devoting themselves to charity work in a spirit of self-less benevolence and dedication as befits Rotary's own motto, Service Above Self," said Princess Chulabhorn.

"It is therefore a great pleasure to see members of Rotary International from all parts of the world, including their families, gathered here at the convention to reaffirm their faith and to remain steadfast in the ideals of Rotary, firm in their resolve 'to do good in the world'. I am confident that your unwavering commitment and good intentions will reap due reward for our common cause."

'Overwhelmed" by Rotary's goal

Indian philanthropist Rajashree Birla, a widow who has given more than \$4.2 million to the Rotary Foundation for polio eradication, said she has been "overwhelmed with Rotary's polio efforts." Birla and her son, Kumar Mangalam, head the Aditya Birla Group, a "Giving to Living" campaign encourages corporations to "embed giving into their DNA." "When a corporation pushes its energies and helps resolve social sector issues through engagement, it indirectly stimulates its own business development," said Birla. "There is much to be gained when business leaders take giving to heart, and set the mandate of making a difference by caring for people in their community."

Rotarians celebrate two polio milestones

During the third plenary session, Rotarians were congratulated for meeting and exceeding Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge, Rotary's response to \$355 million in matching grants from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for polio eradication efforts. Attendees also celebrated India's removal from the polio - endemic list in February, which leaves only three countries where transmission of the virus has never been stopped.

"There is "But speakers reminded the festive assembly that the work is far from complete, because the ultimate goal has not been reached. "We know that we haven't reached our goal. We haven't ended polio," said John F. Germ, chair of Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge committee. "Our clubs are still planning polio fundraisers for the coming years and encouraging donations from people in their communities."

Germ announced that, as of 4 May, Rotarians and supporters have raised \$215.7 million for the challenge, which runs through June. With Global Polio Eradication Initiative facing a sig-

nificant funding shortfall, it is vital Rotarians keep pushing forward,

Public health emergency

Bruce Aylward, assistant director - general for polio, emergencies and country collaboration for World Health Organization, said "India's removal from the polio - endemic list is perhaps the most important milestone ever on the long road to eradication. It's a magnificent achievement. And it is a Rotary achievement. Today, Rotary's vision of a polio - free world is much closer to reality." But an upsurge in cases of paralysis from polio in Nigeria, Pakistan, and Afghanistan and recent polio outbreaks in China, Congo, and Tajikistan have prompted an "unprecedented push" to finally end polio. This month, 192 ministers of health were to meet to declare polio a public health emergency.

Dr. Adrid's brother, Rene, who lives in the area, was instrumental in the completion of the project.
