Membership Month is now behind us. How'd you do? Did your club induct at least two new members to move you toward 100 in 100 recognition at the District Conference? Remember that membership development is every member's responsibility and is an all-year effort.

September is New Generations month in Rotary. This includes Early Act for elementary school students from the age of 5 to 13, Interact for middle and high school students from the age of 12 to 18, and Rotaract for college students and young adults from the age of 18 to 30. Additionally, New Generations includes our Youth Exchange program and our Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA) programs. Our District is involved in all these programs and we ask Clubs to take an active role in as many of these programs as you can.

Our District supports a very effective RYLA program that will take place March 15 to 17, 2013 at Freedom's Foundation in Valley Forge. We have 12 high school exchange students who arrived recently from other lands who will live with us this academic year.


Each of us will face those mountains in the distance as Lee Ann Womack sings, but will you fear them?

With his physical condition such that he could not walk without help, Ramesh bicycled across the country of Canada to bring awareness to Rotary's efforts to eliminate polio from the earth. Ramesh will join us and tell his story about how he faces the challenges each day with perseverance and confidence. He'll show us what needs to be

done to "finish the job."

Boz, the clown, will join us for our Friday night social time and he tells me he has invited some friends. I can't wait to see what they look like.

Do you have a clown friend? Come Friday and I'll introduce you to my friend, **Boz**.

Holocaust survivor participates in Rotary Peace Forum

Holocaust survivor Ernie Gross spoke at a Peace Forum hosted by the Rotary Club of Abington at Edge Hill July 19. The thirty Rotarians and their guests listened to Mr. Gross describe being taken from his home in Romania by German soldiers, moved to a ghetto, imprisoned in a

concentration camp, and eventually liberated by American soldiers

The presentation, made possible through the cooperation of the Rotary Club of Abington at Edge Hill and The Holocaust Awareness Museum, is the first of several Club events that will promote Rotary's "Peace through Service" theme and the Museum's "Witness to History Project" through personal accounts of the horrors of war.

Mr. Gross used props to show what he was given to eat and drink, and how he and other prisoners survived. To represent an aluminum cup used in the camp, he showed a plastic cup with a string attached so it could be kept close to the detainee and

not lost. If the cup was lost, he said, he would get no food because he would not be given a replacement cup. The only other food given was a potato and a loaf of bread, which had to be shared with a group of seven other prisoners.

He pointed out that because of a lack of nutrition, prisoners were weak and their desire to survive taught normally generous people to become selfish. Gross learned

that even cigarette butts were gold in the camp, since they could be used to trade with other prisoners for their measly portions of food.

A young student, who accompanied her grandfather to the meeting, had asked about donations to the museum. She offered Mr. Gross \$1 of her own money to go towards preserving and maintaining the Holocaust Awareness Museum at the end of the meeting.

The Rotary Club of Abington at Edge Hill will schedule other survivor programs in the future, such as one with American soldiers who helped to liberate the survivors from the camp.

Local artist donates oil painting for Rotary auction

When fine artist Monique Kendikian-Sarkessian read about the new book, "Facing the Monster: How One Person Can Fight Child Slavery," and learned about Rotary District 7450's projects to help survivors of slavery locally

and globally, she gave a generous gift: "Fox Fire Waterlily at Longwood." The oil painting will be auctioned off November 10 during the 2012 District "Fox Fire." a Conference. spectacular oil painting on panel, can be seen until October 26, at an exhibit of the painter's works created by Frank Giammatteo at Steel City, Phoen- ixville.

In November, the painting will be auctioned at the District Conference after a presentation about fighting slavery here and overseas. All proceeds will go to Jumpstart, a new project at a children's rescue center in Thailand, visited by DG Dave Ellis, PDG Bonnie Korengel and Rotarian Mike Korengel this past May.

The donation of the painting by Kendikian-Sarkessian and the

upcoming support for the Thai center are the newest in a significant line of anti-human trafficking and rescued-slave rehabilitation projects by District Rotary Clubs. Over the past four years, the Rotary Clubs of West

Chester Downtown, Great Valley, Kennett Square, Central Chester County and others have provided funds for cows, a bio-gas cooking system and solar streetlamps at a girls' rehabilitation center; a raidand-rescue vehicle for a center in India for boys liberated from slavery; and furniture, books and transportation passes for a local program for adult female survivors. Most recently Frankford Northeast, Great Valley and West Chester Downtown Rotary Clubs, as well as the District Literacy committee and Literacy Endowment Fund, gave personal hygiene products and books to a Philadelphia-area homeless youth shelter that has an antihuman-trafficking outreach program.

As part of her global efforts, Dr. Wade serves on the Nominating Council for the Nobel Peace Prize. In addition to her impressive professional credentials in conflict resolution, Dr. Wade has been locally active in neighborhood efforts to end the violence in Philadelphia streets and homes.

She has organized Peace Walks and in 2011, she helped organize a Peace Olympics in North Philadelphia which went from a Recreation Center to the Wayland Temple Baptist Church on Cecil B. Moore Avenue. Dr. Wade and Rotarian Joan Harris are active in that church.

Another Peace Olympics is being planned for

Spring 2013. The continuing program is called "Peace on the Block," featuring crafts, games and other activities to engage children and youth in North Philadelphia.

For the year 2012-13, the Madrugadores Club is launching as its first project, a Peace Assembly on International Peace Day-Friday, September 21, and a Peace Walk on Saturday, September 22. The Club has invited Dr. Wade to provide her counsel in our Club organization of the September Peace events. Local community organizations, churches and recreation centers have been invited to collaborate. We welcome other Rotary clubs to join us.

Past AG John Washington seeks help for our troops

District 7450 Rotarians are invited by past AG John Washington to join Jenkintown and Abington at Edge Hill Rotarians in collecting comfort articles for troops serving in Afghanistan.

In his newsletter to Area 2 Rotarians, Washington reported that to date, he has mailed close to 1,000 pounds of comfort items collected by Rotarians and is planning to send another shipment in September to an Army officer who is a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar alum.

In the newsletter, Washington thanked the Jenkintown Rotarians that contributed items to the parcels in support of our U.S. troops serving overseas and to District Governor Dave who contributed his 50/50 winnings on August 14 while at the Club for his official visit to help pay for the postage.

He reported four packages, weighing just under 25 pounds, were mailed to First Lieutenant Tom Anderson, US Army, in Afghanistan, the third mailing to Tom. The Club previously supported Captain TC Sawick, USMC, during his nine-month deployment. Washington indicated he has supported the troops since some of his police officers at Penn and fellow firefighters were called to active duty starting when he was a member of Abington at Edge Hill Rotary Club which supported sending personal care products, toiletry

articles, protein foods, candy, gum, games, etc. A framed American flag that flew over a Forward Operating Base, sent by one of soldiers as a "thank you," hangs in the office of Abington at Edge Hill past president Brian Wirtshafter. Another hangs in Washington's office at the police station and one at his home. He adds, "They all mean a great deal to me but not as much as the respect I have for those that put themselves in harms way for us."

The September boxes will be sent to 1st Lieutenant. Tom Anderson, who was a 2011-2012 Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholar at the London School of Economics for his MBA following graduation from West Point. Prior to attending the London School of Economics, Tom completed the two-month Army Ranger School at Ft. Benning, Georgia earning his Ranger Tab and qualified as a "master Jumper." He is at Combat Outpost Nerkh, located just 25-kms from the Pakistan border.

Last month, four of his embedded Afghan translators were walking to the town when they were kidnapped and beheaded for being collaborators.
