Ramesh Ferris: Does not let polio stop his 'mission'

Ramesh Ferris, Saturday afternoon speaker at the 2012 District Conference and a Rotarian with Whitehorse Rendezvous Rotary Club, in Canada, was born in 1979 in Coimbatore, Tamil Nadu, India. He contracted polio at six months and his legs were left paralyzed for life.


With no means or access to rehabilitation for him, Rajesh's mother placed him in Families for Children, a Canadian-founded orphanage, a year later. Soon after, Ron Ferris, Anglican Bishop of Yukon in Canada, and his wife, Jan began the lengthy process to adopt Ramesh and take him to Canada. With the support of his new Canadian family and after several operations, Ramesh learned to walk with crutches and braces for the first time when three and one-half years old.

After graduating with his diploma in social work from Confederation College in Thunder Bay, Ontario, in

2001, Ramesh has been active in his community working with at-risk youths, social welfare recipients and people of varying abilities. In recognition of his work with youth, Ramesh received a Paul Harris Fellowship in February, 2008 by the Whitehorse Rendezvous Rotary Club.

In 2002, Ramesh returned to India to meet his biological mother and to visit the orphanage where he once lived. Ramesh learned of polio survivors who, without the necessary medical attention and supports, were forced to pad their knees with cut-up pieces of tire and crawl on the



ground. As a result of what he saw, Ramesh made plans for "Cycle to Walk Canada" with a focus on "Polio Eradication, Education and Rehabilitation."

In 2008, Ramesh hand-cycled 4400 miles across Canada, participated in 350 media interviews and made over 200 presentations at schools, Rotary Clubs, churches and various levels of government and raised thousands of dollars and increased the awareness of polio dramatically.

In April, 2010 Ramesh released his first book entitled, *Better Than a Cure, One Man's Journey to Free the World of Polio*, which covers the speaking circuit in India, United States,

Puerto Rico, Australia, and throughout his home country of Canada, talking about his experiences surviving the effects of polio and the need to end polio now.

Ramesh has had opportunities to share the "Message of Polio Eradication" to delegates of the Rotary International Convention 2010 in Montreal, Canadian Prime Minister Stephen Harper, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, Secretary of Puerto Rico, former governor of Alaska Sarah Palin, and to delegates at the United Nations in New York City.

Ramesh looks forward to talking with Rotarians at the District 7450 Conference and sharing his personal journey of surviving polio and invites you to join in the efforts of making our global community polio free.

Over \$33,000 was donated to 13 Chester County charitable organizations at the 10th Annual Chili Cook-off hosted by the Rotary Club of West Chester. At the kick-off October 14, the organizations which received some of the proceeds from last year's event were introduced to the community.

Making the introductions and presenting certificates of appreciation for their work was Club President Jeannie McGinn (photo right, center, blue shirt) to representatives from The Arc of Chester County, Care Center Foundation, Chester County Children, Inc., Crime Victims Center of Chester County, Inc., Domestic Violence Center of Chester County Inc., Friends Association for the Care and Protection of Children, Handi-Crafters, Legal Aid of Southeastern Pennsylvania, Maternal and Child Health Consortium, Safe Harbor of Greater West Chester, Inc., West Chester Food Cupboard, West Chester Public Library, and Wings for Success.

The agency grants will provide music therapy for children, after-school and summer camps for at-risk children, training for professionals working with crime victims, reduce homelessness among families, provide housing assistance to persons with disabilities, quality legal aid to low income individuals, support to mothers and babies, housing for homeless men and women in the winter, food to supplement groceries for needy families, providing programs and materials for children, and clothing items for needy women seeking employment.

Each year in the fall, several thousand individuals, couples



and families converge on downtown West Chester to enjoy samples of chili prepared by over 70 teams of non-profit organizations, businesses, restaurants and others.

The public picks their favorite chili and the most decorative booth and enjoy the offerings of local vendors, the children's fun zone, and more.

While most of the proceeds from the chili cook-off support local charities, some goes to providing clean water to families in Kenya, and a medical clinic In Honduras both started by West Chester Rotarians. The club also recently contributed funds to assist the West Chester Rotaract Club with rebuilding a school in Liberia.

 Lodge has provided housing for
 patients and their families who
 have to travel long distances to
 receive care in the Philadelphia
 area hospitals. In the past year

alone this saved over \$14 million in hotel and related costs for these families.

RI commits \$75 million additional funds for 'End Polio Now'

GOOD-BYE POLIO

September 27 was another significant milestone in

Rotary's nearly 25--year battle to eradicate polio.

On that day at the 67th Session of the UN General Assembly in New York City, United National Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon convened a special high-level event highlighting progress and challenges in the effort to eradicate polio.

Secretary-General Ban, who has made polio eradication a top priority of his second term, issued a strong call to UN member states to

ramp up their support for the polio eradication initiative. Other speakers included Wilfrid J. Wilkinson of The Rotary Foundation, Bill Gates of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, and presidents of Afghanistan, Nigerian, Pakistan, Australian Prime Minister, and representatives of U.S. Health and Human Services, World Health Organization, UNICEF Wilf Wilkinson said, "We are at a true tipping point, with success never closer than it is right now. We must seize the advantage by acting immediately, or risk breaking our pledge to the world's children."

With only Pakistan, Afghanistan, and Nigeria as countries where the wild polio virus is endemic, and only 145 infections this year-to-date, we are ever so close. But the \$790 million shortfall this year has already affected

scheduled several i m m u n i z a t i o n activities in polioaffected countries. So we must bridge the gap so as not to derail the entire program. If eradication fails and polio rebounds, up to 200,000 children a year could bе paralyzed.

Rotarians, we must answer the call. We can't stop now. The stakes are too high. As Rotarians, we made a promise to the children of the world that we MUST keep on. One way you can help is to visit http://www.endpolio.org/ and sign the petition calling on world leaders to commit additional resources to close the funding gap. The initial 6,000 signatures were presented to Secretary-General Ban in New York September 27.
