Hook School is a wonderful school and we have worked with them over the years with such things as the Dictionary Project. We hope it will not be too long before we are visiting the school again."

Again this year, the Rotary Club will sell oranges and grapefruit from Florida through the beginning of March, with delivery of the fruit near the end of March.

All 53 Club presidents have been contacted by co-chairs Karen Mazzarella (past president of Glen Mills Rotary Club) and Lizabeth Conners (West Chester Downtown Rotarian) and are asked to sponsor two students for the weekend.

The weekend includes programs on Interact, Rotaract and Youth Exchange programs. The District's Rotary exchange students also have been invited.

DG Dave Ellis will present a discussion on "Why Rotary," drawing on his many years of membership, service and leadership positions.

The Four -Way Test will be presented via an interactive presentation by Longwood Rotary Club past president Dave Haradon Philadelphia Police Lt. D. Pace, Rotary Peace Scholar to Bangkok, will return to RYLA to discuss "Conflict Resolution" and his experiences while studying in Bangkok. A new program on "Anti-bullying" will be handled by Glen Riddle Rotarian Dr. Claudio Cerullo.

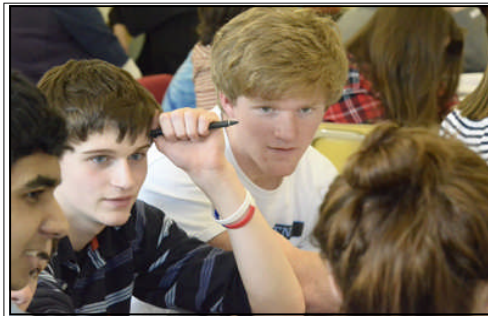
The weekend offers students many opportunities for networking with other students in the District and a project fair will showcase fundraising.

A project fair will showcase fundraising ideas and projects by District Interact Clubs which the students can take back to their schools for discussion.

A big part of the weekend is having students find out about their leadership skills through the Meyers Briggs test and the Free Enterprise Challenge.

The Meyers Briggs test, administered by a member of the Freedoms Foundation staff, is designed to help students discover their leadership style and where their strengths lie.

In the Free Enterprise Challenge, students, working in groups, create a marketable product with sustainability

from various items in a paper bag. The product has to be marketed, priced and presented to the entire group. Rotaractors will judge each group and give positive and constructive feedback.

Bruce Dearnley, **District 7430 Rotarian and a first responder**, will demonstrate the ShelterBox and how it is used in a disaster. Dearnley also will facilitate a breakout on the ShelterBox during which students will simulate a natural disaster. The students will be encouraged to partner with other Interact or Rotary Clubs to sponsor a ShelterBox in the

future.

District Rotaractors will be an integral part of the weekend as facilitators and mentors. District Rotaract Representative Tierney Ulmer has been involved in getting Rotaractors to register to chaperone and facilitate. The sponsoring Rotary Clubs are asked to send \$250 for each student application to the same address. Checks should be made out to Rotary District 7450 with RYLA listed on the memo line. Names of students should be included with the paperwork.

Rotary Clubs also are responsible for registration fees for their exchange students; however the \$25 student fee is waived.

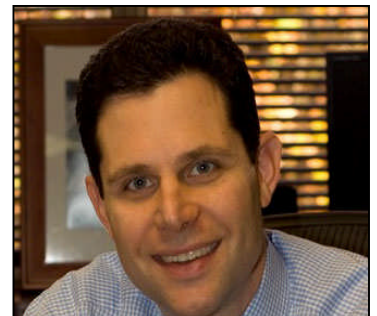

**For 2014-2015 Rotary year****Applications available for Peace Fellowships**

Rotary International is seeking applicants for the prestigious "Peace Fellowships" for study commencing in 2014-2015.

Peace Fellowship 1 is a fully paid two-year master's degree at one of five overseas university centers.

Peace Fellowship 2 is a totally subsidized three-month certificate program at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand.

**Qualifications:** The Peace Fellowship 1 requires at least a bachelor's degree, and is for persons already out in the world of work, i.e., at least three years of work experience is required.

The Peace Fellowship 2 three-month certificate program requires at least some post-secondary coursework, and five years minimum work experience.

**Application Procedure:** Peace Fellowship applications must be downloaded from the Rotary International website. Candidates must initially seek and receive the endorsement of a Rotary Club in District 7450.

Applicants will need to demonstrate how they possess the Rotary ideals/goals of building peace, preventing violence, mediation and compromise.

Applications will be accepted by the Rotary District 7450 Scholarship Committee until April 3, 2013. Interviews will occur in May of 2013.

## District issues report on 2012-13 TRF funds for District, Clubs

Vasanth Prabhu, chairman of the District Rotary Foundation Matching Grants subcommittee, has compiled the following report on our TRF District Designated Fund including matching grants approved for 2012-13.

District Designated Fund (DDF) represents 50% of the Annual Program Fund Giving (APF) from three years prior (with some minor adjustments). For the 2012-13 year we look to the 2009-10 year when the APF was \$135,769.86. This makes the adjusted DDF \$68,695.87.

DDF for 2012-13 that is for completed, committed, and requested projects:

1. Ambassadorial Scholar (committed) \$27,000
2. GSE Team Funding (committed) \$5,000
3. District Simplified Grants (DSG) Represent 20% of DDF (see below) \$13,577
4. Matching Grant (MG) in Jundiai, Brazil \$2,000  
to provide a sensorial track and rain water capture system to ATEAL (Association for the deaf).
5. Matching Grant (MG) in Guaxupe, Brazil \$2,000  
to provide a transportation van for the disabled/handicapped kids – project completed.
6. Matching Grant (MG) in Chester PA. \$2,000  
to provide a learning center for underprivileged kids in the area.
7. Matching Grant (MG) in Cuernavaca, Mexico \$2,000  
to provide funds for the repair and distribution of wheel chairs for the handicapped.
8. Matching Grant (MG) in Thorndale Coatesville, PA  
to provide a chest compression system (WCAS) for a local fire company. \$2,000



9. Matching Grant (MG) in Manipal Udipi, India \$2,000  
to provide solar lighting to houses of the financially weaker sections of the society.
10. Matching Grant (MG) in Peshawar, Pakistan \$2,000  
to provide vocational training for unemployed youth.
11. Matching Grant (MG) in Tehuacan, Mexico \$2,000  
to provide education, clothing, and medical help for kids from economically challenged families.
12. Matching Grant (MG) in Turkey \$2,000  
to provide library books for primary schools in rural Turkey.
13. Matching Grant (MG) in South Africa \$2,000  
to furnish a multi-purpose training center previously build with MG funds.

Total DDF committed and requested \$65,577 including total DSG listed below.

Available DDF for International projects \$3,118.87  
District Simplified Grants (DSG)

The first deadline for receiving applications was September 30, 2012 and four applications were

approved at that time:

1. Langhorne – to provide quilts for children with life threatening illnesses. \$ 500

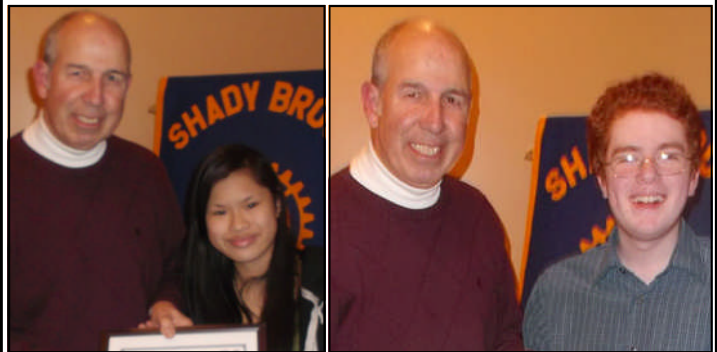
## Broomall Rotary Club hosts Pennsylvania State policeman

Broomall Rotary Club president Pennsylvania State Police officer Lou Vitali (right) spoke at the January 22 meeting of Broomall Rotary. Officer Vitali is a 14-year veteran of the State Police and served in the Marine Corps for 12 years. One of his responsibilities is that of a firearms instructor. Vitali gave an informative talk on firearms as they pertain to police use and reviewed various firearms from handguns to automatic weapons along with common terminology used. He clarified that most of what is referred to in the media as automatic weapons are actually semi-automatic, meaning one bullet is fired with one pull of the trigger. True automatic weapons are machine guns and are nearly impossible to obtain legally, even as a police officer.

The term "assault weapon" is a poorly defined term that is commonly used for guns that resemble military weapons. Of note, none of the recent high profile shootings involved automatic weapons.

## Understanding Foundation Recognition Points

### What are Foundation recognition points and how are they accumulated?

Foundation recognition points are awarded to donors who contribute to The Rotary Foundation through the Annual Programs Fund, Foundation Fund, or PolioPlus, or as a sponsor portion to a Foundation grant. Donors receive one Foundation recognition point for every U.S. dollar contributed to these funds. Contributions to the Permanent Fund are not eligible.

Donors can extend Foundation recognition points to others to help them become or to name them as a Paul Harris Fellow or a Multiple Paul Harris Fellow. Foundation recognition points belong to the original donor until the donor's death, or until the donor uses the points (the surviving spouse of a Major Donor may also use the points).

### How do you transfer Foundation recognition points? A minimum of 100 Foundation recognition points must be transferred at a time, and an authorizing signature is required when completing the Recognition and Transfer Request.

Individual donors are the only ones authorized to transfer Foundation recognition points from their individual account.

Club presidents are the only ones authorized to transfer Foundation recognition points from the Club's account. District governors are the only ones authorized to transfer Foundation recognition points from the District account. Foundation recognition points may not be transferred from individuals to a Club or District.

### Can Foundation recognition points of deceased Rotarians be transferred? No.

Foundation recognition points of deceased Rotarians expire unless the deceased is a Major Donor, in which case, the spouse/partner maintains control of the Foundation recognition points during his/her lifetime.

### Can a business organization become a Paul Harris Fellow?

Paul Harris Fellow awards are issued only to individuals. However, businesses and organizations can be recognized for contributions of US \$1,000 or more with a Certificate of Appreciation.

### Can someone deceased become a Paul Harris Fellow?

Yes. A donor can recognize a deceased individual by requesting a Memorial Paul Harris Fellow.

### Do Foundation recognition points count toward Major Donor recognition? No.

Only cumulative personal outright contributions count toward Major Donor recognition.

### What report tracks Foundation recognition points?

Through Member Access, your Club and District leadership can view the Club Recognition Summary, which provides the recognition amount, Foundation recognition points, current Paul Harris Fellow level, and date that Paul Harris Fellow level was achieved.

Through Member Access, you can view your personal contribution history, recognition amount, and available Foundation recognition points. You can request a copy of your Donor History Report from the Foundation at [contact.center@rotary.org](mailto:contact.center@rotary.org).

**On the Club Recognition Summary, what is the difference between recognition amount and available Foundation recognition points?** Recognition amount reflects all Paul Harris Fellow recognition an individual has accumulated through personal contributions plus all Foundation recognition points given to the individual by other individuals, Clubs, or Districts. Foundation recognition points given to an individual do not count toward Major Donor recognition, and the maximum amount that can be shown on the Club Recognition Summary report is 9,000 (the "+" sign indicates that the actual amount exceeds the 9,000-point maximum).

Available Foundation recognition points reflects points that a donor has accumulated through personal outright giving to the Foundation that has not been previously transferred. All points listed can be transferred to other individuals to help them achieve additional Paul Harris Fellow recognition.

### Can clubs or Districts accumulate Foundation recognition points? Yes.

Clubs can view recognition points in the Club Recognition Summary. District Foundation recognition points are shown in the Donor History Report. Districts may request the report at [contact.center@rotary.org](mailto:contact.center@rotary.org).

### How can I use Foundation recognition points to increase giving to the Foundation?

Matching outright contributions with Foundation recognition points may help your Club reach or even surpass its Annual Programs Fund (APF) goal, as well as achieve 100% Paul Harris Fellow recognition. To determine whether your Club is close to achieving 100% Paul Harris Fellow status, review the recognition amounts of all active Rotarians in the Club Recognition Summary who are currently listed as active Club members. To determine whether you're close to achieving your APF goal, review the Monthly Contribution Report.

**Paul Harris Fellow recognition:** In appreciation to contributor of a gift of US\$1,000 or more to the Annual Programs Fund, PolioPlus Fund, or the World Fund, or as a sponsor portion of a Foundation grant. Person receives certificate and pin. Paul Harris Fellow medallions can be ordered at [shop.rotary.org](http://shop.rotary.org) for \$15 each.

**Certificate of Appreciation:** Donor who contributes US \$1,000 and wishes to recognize a business or organization can request a Certificate of Appreciation since Paul Harris Fellow recognition can only be presented to individuals.

**Multiple Paul Harris Fellow:** Recognition (pin with stones) is extended at subsequent US \$1,000 levels (\$2,000, \$3,000, and so on).

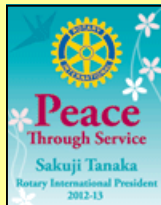
