

### All District Rotarians have received an email from PDG Bonnie Korengel as follows:

"Just yesterday I attended a joint meeting of four Rotary Clubs in Southern Chester County. How inspiring it was as we joined together to start the process of planning a joint Global Grant Project. As we developed the project budget, the dollars multiplied before our eyes through the amazing matching process of The Rotary Foundation – OUR Foundation! We all left feeling that "Together, we can do this!"

"Thank you for being a Rotarian and making The Rotary Foundation one of your charities of choice. Earlier this month, Rotary International congratulated our district on 100% of our clubs making a contribution of some amount; however, we have not yet met our giving benchmark of \$100 per member. With 1,607 members at the beginning of the Rotary year, our goal is \$160,700 to the Foundation by June 30. To date we have donated \$92,663. If we can all give a little more, we will reach our goal.

"The amazing matching process relies on our contributions to the Rotary Foundation. In three years' time, half of our donation will come back to us for District grants, projects and scholarships, and the other half will go into the RI World Fund that is available for matching global projects. No other organization gives back so much from your donation.

"Perhaps you are expecting a tax refund, perhaps you haven't made your full contribution for the year, perhaps you have been inspired by a project your club is doing or a Rotary story that touched your heart.

"Help us reach our annual goal and we can touch more people as we fulfill the Mission of Rotary: improve health, support education, and alleviate poverty to bring goodwill and peace throughout the world.

"Thank you for giving your time, your money and your heart to the world through Rotary! If you have heard the message previously and given, thank you for your patience and your participation. For your convenience, contribution materials are attached.

### <u>Message from TRF chair:</u> Foundation makes case for making 'special gift'

### West Chester Rotary Club water project: A pipeline and a Tank

#### **A Missionary Couple**

Dr. Michael and Kay Johnson had served as Christian missionaries in Kenya for over 10 years prior to working in Ngieni, Kenya. Their work was missionary: "to show God's love to people by helping them find the essential resources for living, food and water." They offered essential care for orphans in Nairobi and its suburbs.

As hard as they worked, though, by 2005, the problem of the children, the third-party victims of AIDS, was getting worse. For some foster parents, it was a sign of wealth to be able to care for another's child. For others, an adopted child became an extra servant.

What they needed was a longterm solution: a plan to keep the kids in Ngieni, near their homes. Nairobi's slums were no place to aspire to. Ngieni had to be made habitable. But, to begin, the water needed to flow.

#### A Pipeline and a Tank

What became known as the Wikya-Kilanani Water Project really started with Charlie Lyddane. Charlie, who is from Malvern, had stayed with the Johnsons on his first trip to Kenya in 2002. Kay then told him about Ngieni: of women who fetched water by walking several miles; who dug for water in a dry river bed; who hauled it

back in old 5 gallon plastic cans. Sometimes they spent the whole day fetching water.

Together, Charlie and the Johnsons dreamed up a plan. Ngieni needed a pipeline and a tank. From this foundation might grow basic health care, productive agriculture, and a cooperative marketing entity. Ultimately, the orphans of Ngieni might be cared for in a stable environment.

Charlie figured they "only needed \$250 thousand." They had shown him the mountain spring where the water came to the surface. A pipeline and a tank. On the plane home, he wondered how to raise the money, but he had no idea.

#### The Rotary Club of West Chester

Charlie discussed the water project idea with Paul Woodruff, CEO of ERM, a member of the West Chester Rotary Club since 1972. He told Charlie that raising the money would be "no problem." Soon the two introduced Dr. Johnson to the Club. The Q&A focused on "What we can do."

For planning purposes, Paul divided the project into four phases. In the first stage, the project sought a matching grant. It would seek another matching grant to finance its second phase. And it would seek a 3-H Grant for its third phase. Finally, it would seek a World Grant.

For now, Paul and Charlie "took the show on the road," presenting at more than 25 Rotary Clubs in southeast Pennsylvania The money came in chunks large and small. The West Chester Rotary Club supplied about one-quarter

of it. ERM and its employees contributed. The other clubs of District 7450, directly and through the Gundaker Fund, also contributed generously.

#### Construction of the Wikya-Kilanani Project

The goal, simply, of the Wikya-Kilanani project was to provide "a dependable, year-round water supply to three villages." Francis Asiema, past president of the Rotary Club of Nairobi South, served as the project manager. He recruited other members of the Club to oversee the accounting, legal work for the adoption, and handled all the paper work and reports required by Rotary International. The people of Ngieni would provide the land; the labor for con-

> struction, operation and maintenance; and the local materials such as sand and ballast. Eliud Mambo, a community leader, assembled the construction crew.

In Charlie's experience, reflecting back, it was "crazy." In the U.S., he pointed out, "if you needed gravel, you'd order it; a truck would dump it where you needed it. In Ngieni, they made it."

A trench was dug. The twoinch pipe was laid. They positioned the two large concrete settling tanks; attached the plumbing and meters. A pipeline and a tank.

Today a woman sits at the kiosk and measures the water, charging a couple of shillings or so to fill a can. The charge is small. It mainly imposes a sense of value and covers the maintenance.

#### **Plans for the Future**

It was mid-2007 when the water first flowed through the Wikya-Kilanani pipeline. By 2008, the "Prepared Place" looked forward to building libraries and primary schools. Some had received drought resistant seeds, cattle and goats, as well as training in agricultural practices. The community was regularly visited by doctors and nurses.

Then a second pipeline – the Makeveti line – was built. It supplies water to a Medical Clinic, a school, the school's showers, besides the water kiosks at the second village. Along both the lines, the community has established vegetable gardens.

And then a third, which is almost complete. Along the way, water will be supplied to community water points, the proposed polytechnic school, and cattle troughs.

On the whole, it could fairly be said that the lot of Ngieni is better. The children of Ngieni are healthier and better fed. Fewer are destined for Nairobi slums. Dr. Johnson observes, "The women are growing gardens and the orphans are getting loving homes."
