will be on leadership development and training, promotion of international understanding and goodwill, and the conduct of a viable mentoring project. "Important to fulfilling our mission



<u>At 105th RI Convention</u> 'Climb for a cause'

More than 316 Rotarians from all over the world smashed two world records on the Sydney Harbour Bridge, Friday, May 29, and raised enough money to protect more than 240,000 children against polio. The records are: Guinness World Record for "most different flags flown simultaneously" (previously set by BridgeClimb in 2010), and most people on the Sydney Harbour Bridge at same time, (previous record was 316 in 2011). Led by RI president Ron Burton, each adult



climber raised \$124 (50 percent of \$248 fee) from the Bridge Climb. Flags from 208 countries were carried by Rotarians.

<u>At 105th RI Convention</u> 'Make History Today Walk'





Youth Exchange Program needs host Clubs, families

Donna M. Henry, chair of the District Youth Exchange program, reports the District will welcome 10 exchange students in August for the 2014-2015 school year. The committee is looking for host Rotary Clubs for three students and host families for seven students.

From August to January the students will live with one family and will move to a second host family from January to June. Henry says should there be three host families in one area, the second host family would serve January to April and



would serve January to April and the third host family would serve April to June.

The Rotary Clubs, who will be sponsoring students, include Abington at Edge Hill, Cheltenham, Greater West Chester Sunrise, Swarthmore, Ardmore, Longwood, (two students) and Chestnut Hill.

Henry points out "Almost anyone can host. They do not need to be Rotarians. Hosts can be families with children, couples without children, empty nesters, and single people.

"There is no monetary compensation for hosting. Host Rotary Clubs give \$100 per month to the students."

RI Foundation OKs global grant for Ardmore–Japan project

Ardmore Rotary Club received the Rotary Foundation go-ahead for a \$197,775 global project to rehabilitate an existing building into a child and maternal health center and health care training facility in Kesennuma, Japan. The center will serve 2500 children and mothers who survived the 2011 earthquake and tsunami. Ardmore Rotary Club partnered with Kesennuma and Tokyo Rotary Clubs in developing the project.

Ardmore Rotary Club raised \$27,000 with a seed grant of \$6,000, \$4,950 District 7450 DDF grant, \$1,000 Gundaker Foundation grant, and contributions from the Rotary Clubs of Broomall, Bryn Mawr, Coatesville, Media and Swarthmore. In addition contributions were received from four individuals, and the Washington (D.C.) Rotary Club.

Ardmore Rotary Club, which has a 40-year partnership with the Tokyo Rotary Club, joined with the Tokyo Club in 2011 on a \$255,000 new "Rotary Child Care Center," which opened early 2012 in what had been Rikuzentakata City. Ardmore raised \$54,000 for that project.

Langhorne Rotarians clean local highway, storm drains





Because we are developing new techniques like border immunization stations for highly mobile populations to make sure that all children, even those on the move, are protected. And certifications of immunization are now being required at many border crossings.

Because we have achieved great success, even in Nigeria and Afghanistan where the number of polio cases was down 40% in 2013 from the previous year.

Because for every \$1 your Club raises, the Gates Foundation will match with \$2. So your efforts really can yield results!

Because Rotary has already donated \$1.2B to the cause and we have pledged to finish the job.

Because if we don't, more than 200,000 children could be infected by 2022.


Because there are still many people in our communities who are willing to help but we have to lead the way.

Lindsey Elkin:

District's final ambassadorial scholar responds to RI survey of experience

RI: How would you describe Rotary to friends, colleagues and family? How would you describe the Ambassadorial Scholarship?

ELKIN: Rotary is an unbelievable organization, made up of thousands of diverse individuals who have one thing in common: making the world a better place through a devotion to service above self. I cannot say enough good things about Rotary. I have met such fascinating, impressive individuals through this experience. As I continue to get older and busier, I see how difficult it is to make time for extra activities. The devotion that Rotarians have toward furthering the ideals of goodwill peace and understanding should be emulated at a global level. We can all learn something from Rotary, and I deeply admire each and every Rotarian I have encountered from the start of the application process.

I would describe the Ambassadorial Scholarship as a life-changing opportunity, where one is provided with an incredible privilege to perform their duty in bridging cultural gaps, broadening their personal horizons, and furthering goodwill, peace and understanding through study and cultural immersion. I will be forever grateful to Rotary for the experience provided. Rotary changed my life.

I will always be indebted to the organization, and open myself up in any way that I can assist. I actually will be staying an extra year in South Africa working on my thesis, and I plan on remaining active with my host club and the other clubs in District 9350. Following my eventual return to the U.S., I plan on joining Rotary and helping provide others with the invaluable experience I was provided with.
