Message from DG Doug

Fellow Rotarians and Friends,

Our International President Gary C.K. Huang wants us to "Light Up Rotary!"

However, as cheerful and energizing as this theme may be, I suggest that this goal is easier said, than done! I think the problem is not that we lack dedicated Rotarians who are and do "Light Up Rotary", but that perhaps our Rotary windows to the outside world are somewhat "draped"! We have great Clubs with enthusiastic



members seeking to help their fellow man, both locally and internationally. Their "Light" is shining brightly, but given the challenges our world faces, and the number of well-intentioned people and organizations seeking to address those challenges, we can ask whether our Rotary "Light" stands out sufficiently among all the other activities of life to be recognized for the treasure that it really is?

Is our window sufficiently open or undraped enough for non-Rotarians to become aware of our good works and intentions?

As I listen to our Rotary leaders at the Zone Institutes and the International Convention, I realize that they worry that Rotary is not growing fast enough in resources, membership and visibility to meet the great challenges of our time.

So our challenge is to not only maintain what we love about our Clubs and their accomplishments, but to also to accept, as part of our Rotary mission, the need to make all Clubs stronger, to grow the wide resource base of Rotary, and to make our worthy efforts so visible to others that they wish to join with us in building that healthier, more prosperous and more peaceful world.

We need to meet this challenge of being recognized by others for what we do, not because we want the praise, but because we want others to join us in this worthy effort!

I am sharing with you my thoughts on how we might build upon the good and well- intentioned efforts already made by our International, our District, and more importantly our Clubs.

I am seeking feedback and insight from our District leadership and you, my fellow Rotarians, on these thoughts, so view this as a work in progress. Elements of these suggestions or emphasis may change, but please join with me in thinking about and then acting to make Our Rotary Stronger and More Effective.

We want to "Light Up Rotary" so that we can help "Light Up the World!" I suggest that the plan needed to achieve this goal is based on "Addition", not "Subtraction":

The Process of "Addition" does not require or seek any diminution in Club authority or practice; in other words, no "Subtraction" of those projects and programs important to District Clubs.

However, I do hope that we do more "Sharing" with other District Rotarians, of information and content regarding successful membership initiatives, fund-raising projects, and, very importantly, service projects that will serve to enable every Club to become more effective and active, both by themselves and in partnership with other Clubs.

I also hope to identify strategic partners from our Delaware Valley community who will join with us in Service and Outreach as we seek to do good and do good more broadly.

We want to make Rotary more visible and relevant; not for our own good, but for the additional good we will be able to do! I'll speak more about this in a moment.

We need to seek to grow membership, but I think the path to membership success is to show to prospective members what we do as Rotarians for others, and, along the way, what

we enjoy by way of fellowship and learning.

I hope to make the goal of increasing membership less a "stand alone" goal and more the result of increased visibility and action—i.e., a derivative goal because our Rotary Clubs have become more visible in their local communities and have worked successfully with strategic local partners in our six Areas of Focus.

I believe we will attract new members more "naturally" by letting our light shine more visibly and effectively.

Youth programs must be maintained and enhanced via invigoration of our Early Act, Interact and Rotaract programs. We need to actively seek to increase the number of Early Act, Interact and Rotaract Clubs.

Consider a formal program to financially assist youth leaders' attendance at Youth events along with selected RI events. We should seek, where appropriate, to include Rotaractors in Area of Focus missions.

Consider a Youth Sponsorship Fund (such as a Talent Night event) or a portion of General Sponsor Funds being devoted to Youth Programs and Travel.

Develop a "matching fund" or "Challenge" type initiative so that youth learn about the need to support themselves while simultaneously receiving support from the District.

Seek to include Rotaractors, where appropriate, on Vocational Training Teams as they are the professionals of tomorrow!

Increase the Gundaker Foundation's Utility to District Rotary Clubs.

Seriously evaluate the issue of establishing a Donor Advised Fund or Community Foundation within the Gundaker framework so that local Clubs can attract donors who wish to make tax-deductible contributions in support of a their local Rotary Club.

Seek to make both Gundaker and Rotary Foundations' charitable contributions more visible to the broader community so that both may attract additional donations and thus be able to do more good at home and abroad!

Establish either within the DRF Committee structure, or as an Independent District Committee, a "Six Areas of Focus Committee" and associated "Individual Area of Focus Subcommittees." The Committee and each Subcommittee would be responsible for within each of the six areas of focus.

Identify local partners (colleges and universities, churches, local NGOs such as Engineers Without Borders, etc.), and business entities that are engaged in service projects both locally and abroad that match our Areas of Focus.

Engage those so identified in a Rotary project, or, in the alternative, have our District and perhaps other Rotary Districts support a project developed or proposed by the non-Rotarian entity with which we share a common purpose.

"Mine" the relevant Rotary Action Groups (RAGs) to identify good projects that can be shared with both local Rotary Clubs and with our area third parties actors in hopes of

encouraging either independent or coordinated action and seek the support of RAG volunteers to define projects and achieve success.

Seek ways to share funding, share credit, and share outcomes, to everyone's satisfaction, in order to multiply results.

Identify good Vocational Training Team opportunities for both District Rotarians and Third Party Cooperating entities.

Seek project sponsors and financial contributions and

participants for various six Areas of Focus projects from the Business and Not-for-Profit Entities and Foundations that work in or have skills and resources specific to each area of focus

Actively seek additional "outside" financial resources for the District, primarily to support District Rotarian and Youth travel to projects and the District Conference.

District 7450 Rotary Clubs are filled with individuals possessing critical vocations skills and the work/service ethic that will enable them to be useful members of a service project, but who may lack the financial resources to participate. Using sponsored funds to help underwrite some portion of travel costs, used in conjunction with a challenge grant model, would encourage and allow broader Rotarian participation in service projects and make our Clubs more visible and viable, thus also attracting new members.

Support appropriate youth involvement in either projects or other District activities.

Use Sponsor Funds to support travel and speaker fees for training events and the District Conference.

Encourage District-wide sharing of projects and skills. The theme of "Addition, Not Subtraction" contemplates Clubs doing what they do best, but being willing to share "secrets" of that success with others. This is not a zero sum game, but a growth game.

In addition, I would like to encourage the smaller Clubs to coordinate with neighboring Clubs, directly or with the assistance of the AGs and myself, to generate effective community projects.

Encourage and train Clubs to undertake "A Community Needs Assessments" to identify what the community perceives are its needs that could be met in whole or in part through Rotary working with the community. Invite all Clubs to consider how they can identify and meet the needs of their communities so that they effectively devote their time, talent and treasure to their local community. The assessment process should not burden Clubs, but be a positive tool

Use District events, especially Team Training and the District Conference, as learning, sharing, and networking opportunities. Make the "inspiration" that of example and not just of exhortation and oratory!

PDG Bob Lankin agreed to serve as the chair of our District Conference Committee. He and I will be seeking your input into and assistance with planning and delivering an informative, useful, stimulating and fun District Conference this November 14-15 at the attractive and welcoming Villanova Conference Center. This will be a sold out event so please plan to attend and please register early. The theme of the District Conference is "Peace, Projects, and Pfun – A Celebration of Service!"

Finally, before I conclude, let's quickly review what we've already accomplished and what remains in the next two months on our District calendar:



Russ deFuria (Upper Darby-Lansdowne) —building relationships locally and globally and providing training for the District Foundation committee

Mike Korengel (Longwood) — building relationships globally and supporting Rotary Action Group against Human Trafficking and Slavery

Carla Chieffo (Paoli-Malvern-Berwyn) — for inspiring her club to sponsor global and District projects and learning the new Grant model

Govinda Malya (Westtown Goshen) — for challenging his Club to reach new heights in Annual Fund giving by providing a match of members' funds; Westtown Goshen Rotary Club per capita is an all-time district high of \$431.

Dennis Wallace (Greater West Chester Sunrise) — for being inspired by a plaque stating "This Project provided by funds from Rotary International" while on a sailing trip, catching on to the system of Rotary matching funds for projects and saying "I can do this too." Bronwyn Martin (Kennett Square) — for her leadership in the "Kick Polio Off the Planet" soccer event which is on its way to being an international project. In addition to District 7450 soccer match to raise funds and awareness for polio, it is spreading to the Northeast and will cross over the Canadian border soon. And for her leadership in providing Rotarians a way to support Rotary with Endowment Fund.

Jane Williams (Ardmore) — for her leadership in raising awareness and funds for Polio through following the monthly polio reports and raising funds throughout the Clubs and her leadership with the polio soccer event.

Andy Jenkins (Longwood) — for Area 9 leadership in pulling 6 Cubs together to do a global water project and successfully navigating the new grant application process.

Ward McMasters (Langhorne) — for leadership and inspiration to Area 1 Clubs to support each Club's giving and increasing the Clubs' involvement in meaningful projects.

Joe Hetherington (Bristol) — for thorough and careful minutes of Foundation meetings and as editor of the "Informant" — District Foundation newsletter.

Joe Batory (Philadelphia) — for passion and leadership as retired chair of Scholarship Committee. With his personal interest and efforts, District 7450 has had three successful peace candidates and several global scholars who will make a difference because of Rotary.

Bensalem Rotarians honor detective

The Bensalem Rotary Club honored Detective Kevin Cornish as Bensalem Township's "Police Officer of the Year" last month. The award is presented to an officer

who exemplifies Rotary's mission of "Service above Self" as well as the Bensalem Police Department's mission of courage, integrity and community involvement. The award was presented to Detective Cornish by Bensalem Township's Director of Public Safety, Fred Harran (left)



and Bensalem Rotary Club 2013-2014 President Roger Caine. Detective Cornish received the award in front of Rotarians and guests, which included his wife, daughter and father. Detective Cornish joined the Bensalem Police Department in 1998 and was a member of the SWAT Team and Motor Patrol before moving over to the Special Victims Unit. He was a lead investigator on a case involving two young girls who were removed from an abusive home with nothing but the clothes on their backs and spearheaded a fundraising effort to collect money and gift cards for the girls so they could buy clothing, school supplies and accessories for their bedrooms at their foster home. He also contacted local stores to get the girls discounts and accompanied the girls on their shopping trips. Detective Cornish's commitment to helping children move on from abusive situations quickly became a department-wide initiative. Today, partnerships with local stores and incoming donations are a constant so that every child who is saved from abuse by the Bensalem Police Department can receive additional support from the department and the community. Detective Cornish also volunteers as a coach at the United German Hungarian Club and presents programs on bullying and computer forensics.

Glen Mills-Thornbury Rotary Club donates \$500 to ALEM

Glen Mills-Thornbury Club President Tony DiLeva (left)presented a check for \$500 to ALEM's executive director Howard Friend to support an unique program for disabled workers and recipi-



ents. ALEM has a workshop in Cuernavaca, Mexico, where a highly-trained team of people with disabilities, design, fabricate and repair specialty wheelchairs, ecumbent tricycles, sports wheelchairs, and custom wheeled devices for children and adults with severe physical challenges. In Cuernavaca, there are a number of organizations that provide free wheelchairs to people with disabilities. But the terrain of the city is rugged and the wheelchairs inevitably break down within two years. People cannot afford to have their wheelchairs repaired. Until ALEM, there were no wheelchair repair services available. The grant subsidizes the repairs, charging clients only for labor, which is a significantly smaller portion of the repair cost. The grant also provides money to purchase a full inventory of repair parts, special equipment and a utility trailer which is used to transport equipment and ALEM team members to other cities as part of an outreach program. This project is unique in that the disabled individuals are the workers in the wheelchair shop.

Rotarians plan to rebuild homes in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

Longwood Rotarian Bob Curran will again lead a trip to Tuscaloosa, Alabama, October 26 to November 1, to continue to rebuild homes and structures destroyed by the April, 2011 tornado.

Trade skills are needed; however Curran says the desire to spend time helping those in need is the sole requirement for a successful trip. Volunteers will stay at a former YMCA camp which is owned by Habitat. For more information, contact Bob Curran at 610-316-3109 or






