We have some Year End Specials of our own! Say YES to them!

On the subject of Giving: Let us remember our own Gundaker Foundation. Rotarians love challenges! For every \$50 that any District Rotarian donates to Gundaker from now until New Year's Day, we (Norm Watts, Alan Simbo, and Doug and Julianna Blazey) have agreed to collectively match another \$50, up to the maximum of \$10,000. So, be generous! And watch this great local fund grow!

Another one of my goals for this Rotary year, which I hope will also become your goal, is to have every Rotarian in the District contribute something to the Rotary Foundation even while we hope for \$100 from every Rotarian (Every Rotarian Every Year) so that every Club can become an EREY Club! Let us begin with this year now! Even a modest \$20 contribution becomes

\$60 in the fight to eradicate Polio, through the two-forone match by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. We are **THIS CLOSE!** Let us do our part in making that contribution **TODAY**.

To encourage every Rotarian to give something to the Rotary Foundation, I have established a Governor's Award for all Clubs that can achieve 100 percent participation in giving to the Rotary Foundation by all Club members, with the Club achieving at least an average \$60 donation. Those Clubs will receive The District Governor's 7450 Special EREY Award. This is a new District Award. Let us be a District where all of our Clubs receive this distinction!

Please remember that the contributions to the Rotary Foundation strengthen peace efforts, provide clean water and sanitation, support education, grow local economies, save mothers and children, and fight disease to transform lives in communities at home and around the world.

To qualify as an **EREY Club** and qualify for an RI award, in addition to 100 percent participation, the average contribution must be \$100 per capita. That average contribution, which may be difficult for some

Clubs to meet, has been reduced to \$60 for the new **District Governor's 7450 Special EREY Award.**

There is also something else we must do in the coming weeks, if Rotary is to prosper in the years ahead. We must take what we learned at the District Conference and elsewhere in our Rotary journey, whether that be on a project mission, at Foundation

training, at Zone or International events, or at the Rotary Leadership Institute, and put those lessons "to work" in making our Club more vibrant and effective and deploying that new energy to "Light Up Rotary." RI President Gary fondly quotes Confucius as saying: "It is better to light one candle, than to curse the darkness!"

Most directly stated, Rotary starts with YOU! Use December and early January to start planning for your Club and your Rotary mission.

Choose to make a Rotary Club New Year's Resolution! Plan to:

- recruit for and support RYLA;
- have an effective fundraiser;
- start or continue to support an Interact or Rotaract Club;
- work on membership recruitment and retention;
- think through possible Club extension;
- create a series of successful local service projects;
- join a District Committee and bring new energy and insight to District management;
- and plan to become engaged in the larger world of Rotary by seeking to participate in a Global Grant or by recruiting a Global or Peace Scholar

There is no end to the list of Rotary projects just as there is no end, at least in sight, of human need and pervasive conflict.

So Rotarians of District 7450, Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukkah, Happy Kwanza, Happy Eid al-Adha, Happy Bodhi Day, Happy Pancha Ganapati, Happy Winter Solstice, and Joy and Peace to all People of Faith and Conscience no matter our gender, color or creed!

Be thankful for our blessings and plan for an even better Rotary starting right NOW!

RI President lights flame in India:

Polio Flame to travel world to proclaim India polio free

Chenna, India- As part of an effort to celebrate the decades- long battle and the ultimate victory over polio in India, the Rotary Club of Madras on December 13 launched a Polio Flame which was lit by Rotary International President Gary Huang (third from right). Also taking part were

Pakistan MP and Prime Minister's focal person for polio eradication in Pakistan, Ayesha Raza Farooq; India's PolioPlus committee chairman Deepak Kapur; RI director P.T. Prabhakar; and others. The flame will be taken around various countries

before reaching Sao Paulo, Brazil for the 106th Rotary International Convention. The trip around the world will commemorate India becoming a polio-free nation and share its experience and expertise with countries where polio still exists. "Fire is a benevolent element in Indian culture and the Rotary Flame launched from Chennai is a manifestation of Rotary's commitment to eradicate polio worldwide," chairman of the Flame Committee Madras Rotary Club PP N.K. Gopinath, said, "Once the epicenter of wild polio virus, India, along with

the World Health Organization's southeast Asia region, was officially declared polio-free in March, 2014. The Rotary Flame will be carried by air to several countries, including three remaining polio-endemic countries of Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan. Before reaching Rotary's International Convention in Sao Paulo, Brazil, in June, 2015, it will

traverse through Colombo, Karachi, Kabul, Sydney, Manila, London, Lagos, Evanston and Toronto.

Supports renovations at Center for Mothers and Children

Members of the Rotary Club of Tokyo and Rotary as well as Washington D.C., South Korean and Club of Kesennuma, Japan toured a building

which is being renovated to house a maternal and child health facility and health care training center that will serve 2500 survivors of 2011 earthquake. The \$197,000 project is funded through a **Rotary Foundation Global** Grant, with funds from Tokyo and Kesennuma, Japan Rotary Clubs and Districts 2580 and 3640 in Japan, and Ardmore Rotary Club in partnership with Gundaker Foundation, District 7450 Foundation, Broomall, Bryn Mawr, Coatesville, Media, and Swarthmore Rotary Clubs,

Germany Rotary Clubs. While waiting for the

center to be opened early next year, mothers and children gather for programs in the temporary center in the maternity wing of the nearby hospital. Plans call for completion of the renovations this month and dedication early in 2015. This is the second center for mothers and children built in partnership with Ardmore and Japan Rotary Clubs with help from other Rotary Clubs in District 7450 and in Japan.

UD-Lansdowne Rotarians host Martial Arts Tourney






