Message from DG Doug

I want to share with you the stories of two District Rotarians that moved me greatly upon hearing them. By singling out these two men, I do not want to imply that the many other Rotarians I do know and the countless other Rotarians I do not know, men and women alike, do not also display this same kind of love or affection for Rotary. But these two men, whom I never met, "Shine" for me and for



Rotary, and I believe, their stories will "Shine" for you as well!

They are Past District Governor (1972-1973) Kenneth B. Erdman of the Chestnut Hill and Cheltenham-Rockledge Rotary Clubs, and Charles Alexander, M.D. member of the now defunct Springfield Club and, until his passing last month, a member of the Haverford Rotary Club.

I met the adult son of PDG Ken Erdman, deceased, on a bus ride from our hotel to the Rotary International Convention venue in Sydney, Australia last June. As Rotarians do, when travelling together, we shared where we were from and the younger Erdman, a Rotarian from Hawaii, spoke up when he heard I was from Philadelphia. He told me that his father, Ken Erdman, has been a PDG in our District and later served as a Director of Rotary International. While these were wonderful accomplishments and worthy of note in themselves, it was what his son said next that really moved me. He said that after serving as RI Director, Rotarian Ken returned to his Club and became the Editor of the Club's Newsletter. His son said he performed this task for years. At one point, his son said he asked him why he was doing this relatively modest task given his years of much greater visibility in the Rotarian firmament. Ken's reply to his son went something like this---- "Well son, our newsletter is really important to our Club and our Community and somebody has to do it. And, it seems, the Club members must think I do it OK as the Club, year after year, keeps asking me to continue."

The second story is more contemporaneous as it is about recently deceased Rotarian Charles Alexander, M.D. of the Haverford Rotary Club. I did not know Charles or how important Rotary was to this distinguished ophthalmologist until I attend his memorial service and funeral last month. Haverford Club President Dara Gans, along with fellow Haverford Rotarians, let Sharon Quick (District Secretary) and I know of the funeral arrangement for Rotarian Charles. Sharon commented to me when we learned of his passing, that she had been helping him access and use DaCdb as he was serving as the Secretary for his new Club, the Rotary Club of Haverford.

So immediately it became pretty clear that Charles was willing to pitch in and help Rotary. And, since his colleagues at the Haverford Rotary made a special point of notifying me of his passing, I thought I would attend the Memorial Service. And I am so glad that I did!

Thanks to research at Duke:

A new role for the polio virus

The polio virus has taken on new meaning over the last several years for researchers at Duke University and their 22 clinical trial patients who have been diagnosed with glioblastoma, a relentless and extremely deadly type of brain tumor.

Researchers at Duke have been infusing their patients' brain tumors with a re-engineered polio virus with remarkable results. Though the doctors are reluctant to use the terms "miracle" and "cure", one leading cancer specialist with 34 years experience, calls it, "..... the most promising therapy I've seen in my career."

On March 26, CBS's 60 Minutes Sunday night program had an extensive report about the research and particularly about two patients who have survived after the treatment for 33 and 34 months. To see the segment in its entirety, go to: http://

This new type of cancer treatment is called immunology which represents a paradigm shift in how cancer is treated. It results from awakening the power of the body's own immune system.

All human cancers develop a shield or shroud of protective measures that make them invisible to the immune system. This method of treatment attempts to reverse the invisibility. By infecting the tumor with the polio virus, it actually removes this protective shield, telling and enabling the immune system to come in and attack.

So essentially what happens is inside the tumor you have a polio infection which sets off an alarm for the immune system to get to work and kill the infection, which in this case is the tumor. The polio starts the killing, but it's the immune system that does most of the damage.

Researchers around the world have been experimenting with a number of other viruses to accomplish the same results, but the Duke researchers chose polio and have been very pleased with results to date. The researchers re-engineered the polio virus by removing a key genetic sequence so the virus could not survive and cause paralysis or death because it can't reproduce in normal cells.

But in cancer cells it does reproduce and in the process of replicating, it releases toxins that poison the tumor cells by attaching itself to a receptor found on the surface of the cells that make up nearly every kind of solid tumor. And because it is a relatively big molecule in the brain's tight space, it is limited in how far it can travel.

One doctor described the infusion procedure like a "sniper's bullet". It needs to hit the target so it doesn't go to the wrong places.

For the last 30 years, Rotarians have looked at the polio virus with only the desire to erase it from the face of the earth because of all the pain, suffering and death it caused. Now it is refreshing to know that it is bringing new hope and extended life to cancer patients with not only glioblastoma but also with lung cancers, breast cancers, colorectal cancers, prostate cancers, pancreatic cancers, liver cancers, and renal cancers.

Note: I encourage you to view the 60 Minutes sequence for more information. It is truly an astounding story and one that is especially personal to me. Five years ago my best friend was diagnosed with glioblastoma on October 19 and died just two months later on December 31. It is a voracious and horrible cancer. JW


