Message from DG Doug:

Sharing three Rotary milestones and seeking year-end project summary from every Club

I'd like to share three milestones we've reached together in my journey as your 2014-2015 District Governor and also make a heartfelt request to each of you that will allow us to celebrate our Clubs' and District's success in placing "Service Above Self" this Rotary Year!

As to the Milestones achieved: On Wednesday, May 6, with my lunch- time visit to the Rotary Club of Bristol, I completed my "Official District Governor Visit to each and every Rotary Club in our densely packed District!

Thank you, the Clubs of District 7450, for letting me serve as your Governor during 2014-2015 and giving me the opportunity to visit each of our Clubs, to learn about your achievements and challenges, and to renew or begin friendships with so many wonderful and committed Rotarians throughout our District. For most of our Clubs, we have wonderful meeting venues and have done great service this past year (more on this in the "request" section).

Second, on Monday evening, May 11, the Clubs unanimously adopted new By Laws for our District 7450 Gundaker Foundation. During the past several months, the Gundaker officers

(President Jim Smith, Vice-President Idna Corbett, Treasurer Norm Watts and Arthur Klein and an ad hoc District Committee comprised of myself, Director Peter Mardinly and PDGs Russ deFuria and Bob Lankin, had worked diligently to address the various concerns that had been raised regarding the proposed set of Gundaker By-Laws which were tables when considered at the November 2013 District Conference. Since we had not achieved consensus on revisions to those By-Laws by our November 2014 District Conference, the consideration of new Gundaker By-Laws was further postponed until May 11.

Prior to May 11, all outstanding differences were resolved and the District Board and the Gundaker Board unanimously adopted a revised set of Gundaker By-Laws which both then recommended to the Clubs of the District for adoption--which occurred on May 11. I wholeheartedly support these new By-Laws and believe they will help usher in a new era of success and vibrancy for this accomplished District Foundation. We also brought into the 21st century a

revised "Articles of Incorporation" that comply with state and federal requirements, by unanimous adoption during the business meeting on May 11.

Finally, on Friday, May 15, my wife returned from New York with our passports endorsed with visas which will permit us to visit Brazil and attend the São Paulo Annual Convention of Rotary International. We expect to learn a lot in São Paulo and return with photos and information to

share next month and in the year to come.

Now for my request to each of our Clubs and to each Rotarian! Let's put together a year-end issue of the *District 7450 Rotary Leader* filled with Club and District activities, accomplishments, and fun!

Over the next two weeks, please assemble text and, where possible, photographs or video with name identification that records the Club activities.

Please also send to me and to your Assistant Governor information on your Club and members' response to the Nepal Earthquake, whether that is to Shelter Box, to other relief organizations, or direct aid to Nepal and its

citizens, so we can tally our collective District response to this ongoing disaster. This will contribute to making Rotary visible and inviting to others. I hope to assemble and report upon all of our Club and District Committee activities in the June 2015 Newsletter featuring "Service Above Self."



It's a busy time of year for the Youth Exchange Committee! We are bracing ourselves for the teary goodbyes next month when the ten students who have been with us since August 2014 go home. At the same time we are preparing for the ten new students who will arrive in August 2015.

We are looking for host families for three boys from Germany, Belgium and Thailand.

The boy from Germany was 16 in April. He lives in the Bavarian section of Germany, but was born in Slovakia. He carves as a hobby, as well as reads. He cycles in the summer and skis in winter. His parents say they wished he was neater.

The boy from Belgium was born in Boston, although his parents moved back to Belgium when he was a baby. He's got a younger brother and sister. He does indoor rock climbing, break and Rock and roll dancing, is a leader in Patro (similar to Boy Scouts), plays golf and rides horses. He's not a picky eater. his friends say he is generous and friendly. His parents say he is mature and responsible.

The boy from Thailand plays the baritone and

is in the marching band. He has a younger brother. He likes to eat healthy food, play basketball and read. He spent a month in China studying Chinese. His parents say he is a happy and easy-going young gentleman .

Ardmore Rotarians lead Sensory Garden cleanup





More than 20 Ardmore Rotarians and area residents, with support from the Lower Merion Conservancy descended on the Ardmore Rotary Sensory Garden in Wynnewood Valley Park in Lower Merion Township April 25 for a massive cleanup of the garden and surrounding area. Ardmore Rotary partnered with Lower Merion Township in 1970s to create what was then called "The Garden for the Blind and Children". Plantings were marked in grail and railings were installed to encourage the blind and others to smell the flowers as part of the identification. Ardmore Rotary, again in partnership with Lower Merion, restored the gardens in 2011 after a three-year campaign for support. The garden, which now is handicapped accessible with walkways throughout, was renamed at the dedication to the Sensory Garden. Leading the cleanup last month was Ardmore Rotarian Libby Goodman.



Glen Mills-Thornbury Rotary Club hosts Designer Handbag Bingo




